A Bible of Their Own

Third graders will celebrate an important faith milestone as they receive personalized Bibles and learn how to explore God’s Word for themselves.

Presenting third graders with Bibles of their own is a longstanding rite of passage—a tradition both sentimental and significant. But why third grade?

According to researchers and educational specialists, this is the age when an important transition often takes place: Students move from learning to read to reading to learn. No longer simply decoding words, they begin processing more complex concepts and informational texts. With their growing confidence and curiosity, third graders are ready to explore Scripture in a new way.

On Sunday, Sept. 20, at 9:30 a.m., White’s Chapel third graders will receive personalized Bibles during a special celebration in the Foundry.

The morning will begin with worship and a brief message from the Rev. Victor Resendiz. Each student will then be invited forward to read or recite a

School is back in session, calendars are filling up and Sunday routines—some new, some familiar—are falling into place. From little ones to longtime friends, every generation seems happy to settle back into the familiar rhythm of Sundays at White’s Chapel.

A Place for Hope and Healing

“The Lord is near to the brokenhearted and saves the crushed in spirit.”
—Psalm 34:18

Loss is loud. Amid pain and suffering, there are many thoughts, voices and opinions about how we ought to respond, which paths toward healing we should take and how we should feel. While these insights can be helpful, often what we need most during a time of grief is a space for quiet.

At 6 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 24, in Walton Chapel, a sacred and special Service of Hope and Healing will be held for anyone in need of prayer. Created with a heart for peace and healing,

the service offers a place for those experiencing any kind of grief or pain — physical, emotional or spiritual. Everyone carries a burden, and sometimes, in a difficult season, having a place to offer that weight to God and reflect on His goodness can be transformative.

“Loss takes many forms,” the Rev. Phyllis Barren said. “It may be the loss of a loved one, a job, a relationship, a marriage that is struggling, or the pain of addiction. Sometimes we find ourselves in a difficult season and need a place to stop, breathe, pray and remember that God is with us.

“There is no expectation that you must have the right words or have everything figured out. It is a time to come as you are, receive prayer, be anointed, participate in Holy Communion and allow God to meet you in the middle of your circumstances.”

After experiencing deep loss, it can become difficult to hold on to hope. We may give up on new opportunities, the possibility of a better future or the belief that goodness can still be found. Yet, as believers, we have hope rooted in the

Dust off the passport. White’s Chapel is heading to Egypt!

Some places are simply visited; others seem to reach across the centuries and

speak. Egypt is one of those places. Here, Joseph rose from prison to power, Moses challenged Pharaoh and the Holy Family found refuge. Along the Nile—yes, that Nile—travelers will be reminded that the God of Scripture is also the God of history.

In fall 2027, WC travelers will explore this extraordinary land with Dr. John

Egypt

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McKellar and Dr. Todd Renner, pairing archaeological wonders with Biblical teaching where familiar stories unfolded. It is about as close to stepping into the Bible as travelers can get without a time machine.

“Egypt is on a lot of people’s bucket lists, and to combine it with the Biblical knowledge of John and Todd will be a real treat,” said Tracy Christensen, White’s Chapel adult ministry director. “This is going to be a new and exciting adventure for all who go on this journey!”

The adventure begins Oct. 19 with an overnight flight to Cairo. On Oct. 21, the group will visit the Grand Egyptian Museum, the Pyramids of Giza and the Great Sphinx. That is quite an opening act.

Travelers will then fly to Aswan and board a Nile River cruise. Stops include the Aswan High Dam, the Granite Quarries and Unfinished Obelisk, the temples of Philae and Kom Ombo, and Edfu’s Temple of Horus. Comfortable shoes are advised; no one will be asked to move an obelisk.

In Luxor, the group will explore Luxor Temple and the vast Karnak Temple complex, including its avenue of sphinx statues and famed Hypostyle Hall. Nearby discoveries include the Colossi of Memnon, the Temple of Queen Hatshepsut and the valleys of the Kings and Queens.

From Luxor, the group will fly to Sharm el-Sheikh, where Oct. 26 is reserved for relaxation and independent exploration—a chance to catch one’s breath and remember which temple was which.

The pilgrimage takes on special Biblical significance Oct. 27 with a journey to Mount Sinai and St. Catherine’s Monastery, near the traditional site of the burning bush, followed by a short hike and Bedouin dinner.

On Oct. 28, the group will travel toward Cairo along the route associated with the Exodus, spend the night in Cairo and prepare for the return flight Oct. 29.

Those not ready to come home may add the “Wonders of Petra & the Dead Sea” extension, Oct. 29–Nov. 1. It includes Amman, Petra, the Dead Sea, the Byzantine mosaics of Madaba and Mount Nebo, where Moses glimpsed the Promised Land.

The Egypt tour starts at \$5,148 per person from Dallas/Fort Worth, and the optional extension starts at \$1,498. Register by Nov. 19, 2026, to receive a \$150 early registration discount.

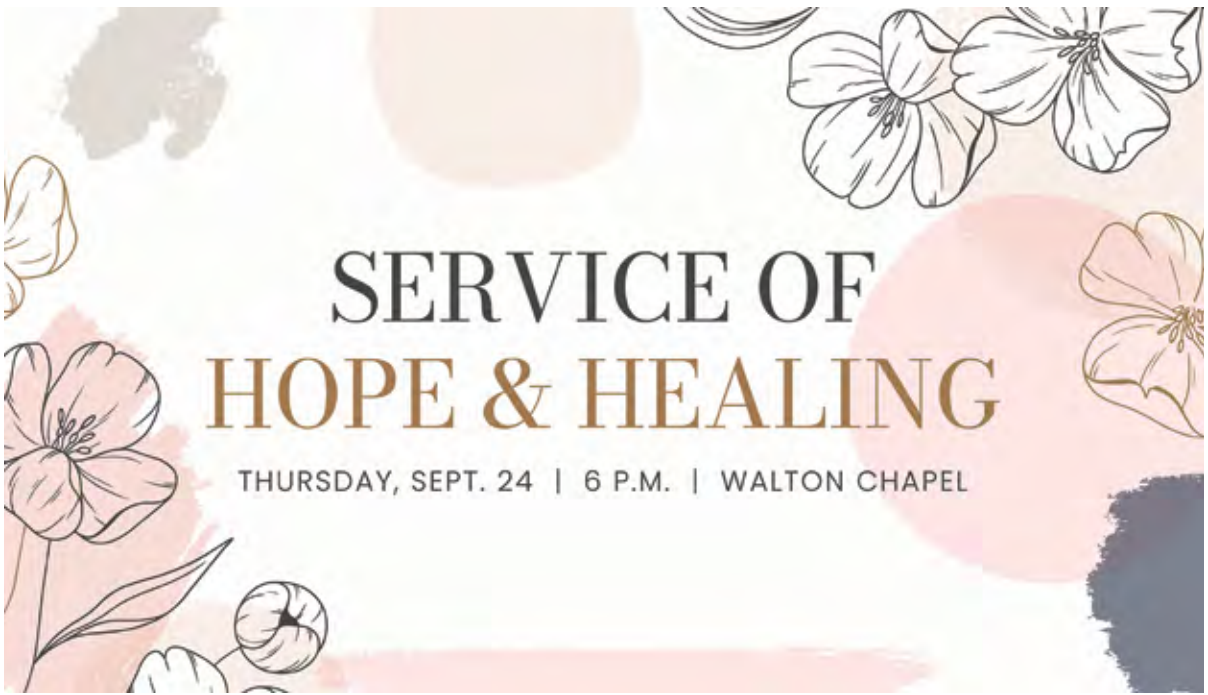

Sept. 13, in Adult Education Room 3103. Christensen will review the brochure, trip highlights, registration and payment plans. Another meeting will be offered in early October. Specific hotel, cruise and flight information is not yet available.

There is currently no limit on travelers, Christensen said, although WC typically prefers groups of 100 to 150.

More than sightseeing, this pilgrimage is an invitation to wonder, worship and learn—to encounter familiar Scripture with fresh eyes. The pyramids are simply a rather impressive bonus.

knowledge that God is at work in our lives. As we seek His goodness, mercy and love, we can trust that hope and healing will spring forward.

“I hope that everyone who comes will leave with a renewed sense of hope and the reminder that healing is possible when we place our lives in God’s hands,” Barren said. “You do not have to have experienced the death of a loved one to come. Loss can be a job, a marriage, a friendship, a dream, your health or a sense of direction in life. It can also be the struggle of addiction or watching someone you love struggle.

“Everyone is welcome. You don’t have to be a member of White’s Chapel or be in a particular place spiritually. If your heart is hurting or you need some time with God, there is a place for you here.”

There is no unacceptable form of loss. We have all experienced pain, and as human beings, we need a place where we belong—a place to lay down our armor and receive restoration for our souls. Scripture reminds us that we will face hardship in life, but we can cling to hope because He has overcome the world, and a new day is coming.

“God does not turn away from us when we are hurting,” Barren said. “He draws

near. We also see throughout Scripture that Jesus continually stopped for people who were hurting, grieving, struggling and searching for hope. The Service of Hope and Healing is an opportunity to do the same—to slow down, come into God’s presence and allow God to bring comfort, strength and hope.”

Are you tired of hiding? Come to this service and find a place where you do not have to conceal what you are going through. Your struggles are welcome here, and nothing is too big or too small for God. There is no pressure to talk, share or explain. You can simply come, be still, pray and receive.

“I have been reminded again and again that we never really know what someone is carrying,” Barren said. “A person may walk through the doors looking perfectly fine while their heart is hurting deeply. I believe this service can be a place where people can set some of that weight down for a little while and know they are not alone.”

You may not leave with all the answers, and your circumstances may remain the same. But this service can give you space to spend time with God and remember that, because of Him, there is always a reason to hope.

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Rotel Pasta

Ingredients

- ★ 1 pound penne pasta
- ★ 1 tablespoon olive oil
- ★ 1 pound lean ground beef
- ★ 1 yellow onion, diced
- ★ 4 cloves garlic, minced
- ★ 1 (10 ounce) can Rotel diced tomatoes with green chilies, undrained
- ★ 1 cup beef broth
- ★ 1/2 cup heavy cream

- ★ 4 oz cream cheese, cubed and softened
- ★ 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- ★ 1 teaspoon chili powder
- ★ 1 teaspoon smoked paprika
- ★ 1 teaspoon garlic salt
- ★ 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
- ★ 1/2 teaspoon black pepper
- ★ 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- ★ Fresh chopped cilantro or parsley for garnish

Instructions

1. Cook the penne pasta in a large pot of salted boiling water according to package directions until al dente. Drain and set aside.
2. Meanwhile, heat the olive oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add the ground beef and diced onion. Cook, breaking up the meat, until browned and the onion are soft, about 5-7 minutes.
3. Add the minced garlic and cook until fragrant, about 1 minute.
4. Stir in the undrained can of Rotel tomatoes, beef broth, heavy cream, cream cheese, Worcestershire sauce, chili powder, smoked paprika, garlic salt, cumin, and black pepper. Bring to a simmer and cook until the cream cheese is melted and the sauce is slightly thickened, about 5 minutes.
5. Reduce heat to low and stir in the shredded cheddar cheese until melted and smooth.
6. Add the cooked penne pasta to the skillet and toss until evenly coated in the creamy Rotel sauce.
7. Serve hot, garnished with fresh chopped cilantro or parsley if desired. Enjoy!

Trinity Habitat for Humanity

White’s Chapel is again working with Trinity Habitat for Humanity to help fund and build a home in southwest Fort Worth. The church needs at least 24 volunteers for the Oct. 3 build. Volunteers must be at least 16 years old; those younger than 18 may not operate power tools.

Trinity Habitat for Humanity is a Christian ministry that partners with people in local communities to help them build or improve places they can call home. Habitat homeowners help build their own homes alongside volunteers and pay affordable mortgages. With the church’s support through sponsorship and volunteers, Habitat homeowners gain the strength, stability and independence they need to build better



lives for themselves and their families.

Volunteers will work, often alongside the home partner, under the direction of Habitat construction leaders. Work on the home’s exterior may include raising walls, installing tornado fortifications and windows, and putting up siding. No prior experience is required.

The workday is from 7:30 a.m. to 1 p.m., but volunteers should plan to arrive early for a few words and prayer. Safety is the top priority, so the workday will begin with a safety lesson from the Cornerstone project manager.

Registration is required and is now open. Early registration is preferred to assist with construction scheduling. Individuals registering additional volunteers should select the number of slots needed and include the volunteers’ names in the comments field. After registering, volunteers will receive an email containing the home’s address, information about what to bring and wear, and a Trinity Habitat liability waiver to bring on the day of the event.

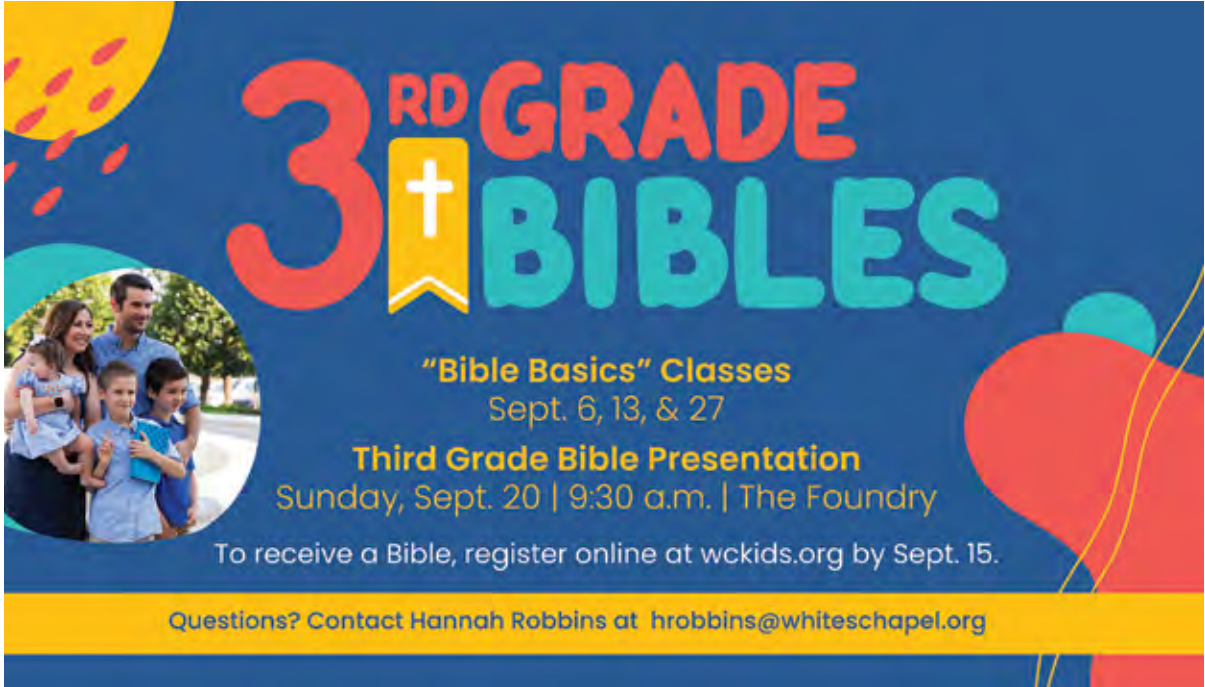

favorite Bible verse before receiving a personalized Bible. Following the service, families will have an opportunity to take photos near the Jesus fountain.

At 11 a.m., the students will gather in the sanctuary for special recognition. They will process into worship behind the pastors, sit together and be recognized by Drs. John McKellar and Todd Renner.

The celebration is part of “Bible Basics,” a three-week experience designed to introduce children to the Word of God. Classes will be offered Sept. 6, 13 and 27 during both the 9:30 and 11 a.m. worship services, allowing families to choose the time that works best for them.

Filled with engaging activities and hands-on practice, the classes will help students understand what Scripture is, why it matters and how they can use it for themselves. During the first two sessions, children will learn how the Bible is organized, practice locating books and passages, and explore its message, wisdom and various translations.

In the final class, held after the students receive their Bibles, they will learn how to highlight meaningful verses, apply

Scripture to their daily lives and find passages through interactive games.

Students will receive the “Hands-On Bible,” written in the easy-to-understand New Living Translation. It includes all 66 books of the Old and New Testaments, along with colorful graphics, experiments, activities and games designed to make Bible reading an engaging experience.

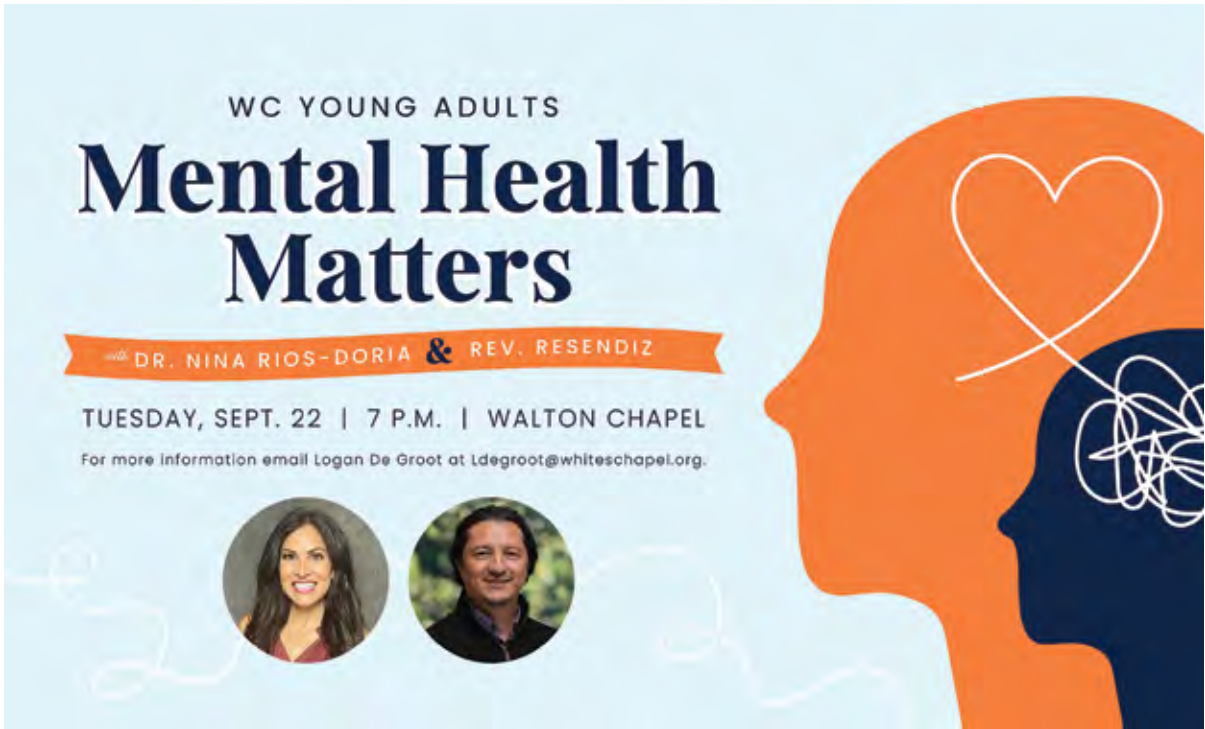
The goal is not simply to place a Bible in each child’s hands, but to give students the confidence and tools to begin exploring God’s Word on their own. These lessons can help lay the foundation for a lifelong journey of faith.

For families, the presentation offers a chance to celebrate the dedication that led to this special moment. For the congregation, it is an opportunity to surround these young students with encouragement and demonstrate what it means to invest in the spiritual growth of the next generation.

Scripture study is a powerful way to deepen our understanding of God, and White’s Chapel is committed to guiding children along that path. Receiving a first personal Bible is an important milestone—one that students and their families will remember for years to come.

Never look down on people. The prisoner today may be your bridge to the next level.

There is a lot of Gospel packed into those few sentences. We live in a world fascinated by **big**—big churches, big crowds, big accomplishments, big names. But God has always seemed strangely comfortable with small things.

A shepherd boy named David.
A baby born in Bethlehem.
Five loaves and two fish.
A mustard seed.
Twelve ordinary disciples.
God seems to whisper throughout

Scripture, *“Don’t worry about starting big. Just start faithful.”*

I especially appreciate Bishop Joe’s reminder not to look down on anyone. Jesus had a remarkable ability to see possibilities in people everyone else had written off. The tax collector. The Samaritan woman. The thief on the cross. People saw their past; Jesus saw their possibilities.

Maybe that is one of the best lessons we can carry into this new season of ministry. Don’t despise where we are. Don’t underestimate what we have.

Don’t overlook the person standing in front of us. And don’t become discouraged because something starts small.

Just keep planting. Keep serving. Keep loving. Keep growing. Keep being faithful.

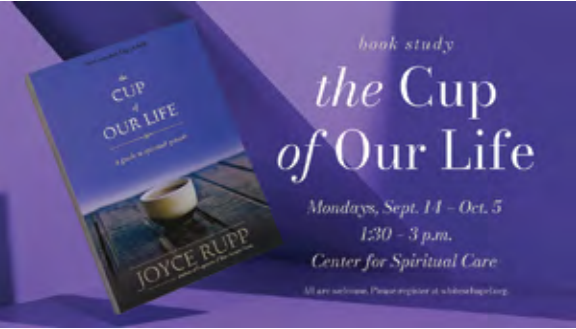
I have lived long enough to discover that some of God’s greatest blessings begin in places that don’t look very impressive at the time.
