—Roger Sherman

As our nation prepares to celebrate Independence Day, most of us can name at least a few of America's Founding Fathers. We know George Washington. We know Benjamin Franklin. We know Thomas Jefferson... but chances are you've never heard of Roger Sherman.

Sherman doesn't appear in many history books, and he certainly doesn't enjoy the celebrity status of some of his contemporaries. Yet he accomplished something no other Founder ever did. He is the only person to have

Building More than Homes

Middle school students discover that a week of serving in San Antonio builds faith, friendships and hope.

On June 8–12, WC Middle School students took a weeklong trip to San Antonio, Texas, where they supported the local community and surrounding neighborhoods through various service projects.

With lodging located on the campus of UTSA, the WC team spent much of its time engaging in hands-on work.

During the week, they served four local San Antonio families, painted three houses and built a wheelchair ramp. By participating in the mission work and selflessly giving of their time and resources to others, the students cultivated a deeper understanding of what it means to love in action and serve sacrificially.

"It was amazing watching the students spend time in worship and connect

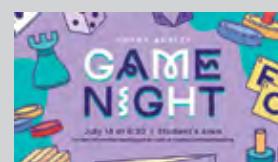

blessings to the people of San Antonio. Through shared experiences under the sweltering Texas sun, the students built friendships with one another and deepened connections with their leaders in an accelerated, yet remarkably special, way.

The focus of this trip was not only to receive 20 community service hours but also to experience God more deeply and tangibly. "This year, the groups were able to

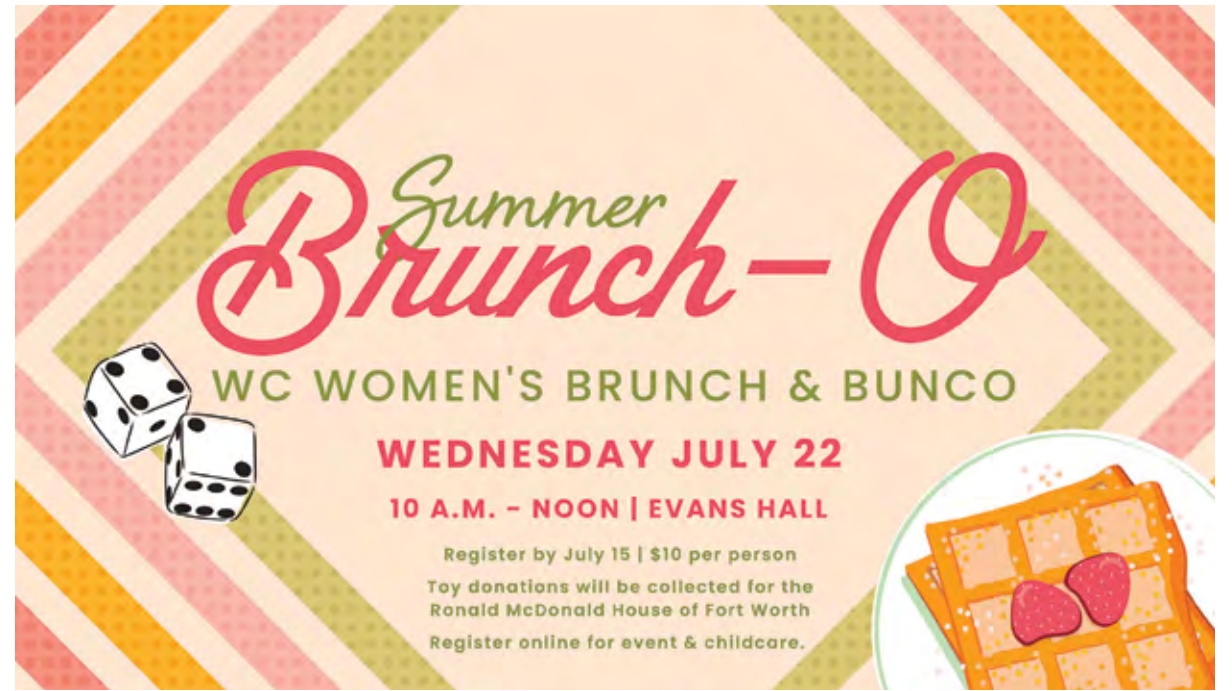

The chaos in Stage 1 comes from realizing you are growing older, and you can't control or hide it. The contentment comes because you can still get up off the floor by yourself, if absolutely necessary, and you really don't care what those youngsters think about you anyhow. Karma will be our revenge.

The best part of Stage 1 is the denial of Stages 2 and 3.

Stage 2: I'd say this is where the chaos really takes hold. Aging is not for the fainthearted (we do sometimes faint, by the way, if we stand up too fast). In this stage, we really start to lose control of many things.

For example, our adult children are no longer very interested in our unsolicited advice and will do what they want. This feels mystifying because we know what they should do—and should not do—but they really don't care what we old-timers think.

Also, we are starting to notice that people around us—parents, siblings and friends—are having lots of medical issues like arthritis, sore knees, high blood pressure, cancer and memory issues. Some are dying. We don't want to be the last one standing, but surely it's not time for that yet!

Another thing: all the stability of knowing what to do with our time each day can become more challenging. No longer is the "Whack-A-Mole" version of time management, which comes with having busy jobs and busy families, needed. Our time is now ours, and we get to choose what to fill that time with.

That is a lot of decision-making, and sometimes our lifelong identity of being needed and being a mover and shaker

does not align with art classes and mahjong.

The contentment in this stage can be harder to find as we realize we are running out of track and our purpose is not as clear. We can become overly fixated on that fact and miss the current scenery of our journey.

The struggle is real. Our purpose and identity may feel unclear, the losses painful and the physical ailments limiting. But this time in our lives can be exciting and come with contentment if we choose to look at it that way. There are so many things to savor, appreciate, ponder, remember and enjoy now that we have time to do so.

Stage 3: What if the last stage of our lives could be one of the best and most contented? We are still here! There is still much to be grateful for.

Figuring out that our children's lives are theirs to journey through, just as we did, brings peace. We have time to savor our cup of coffee, visit friends we haven't seen in a while, or write that note of encouragement or appreciation to someone. Helping others and volunteering can provide a new purpose.

Nuggets of joy might be waiting for us to notice them. Each day, hour and minute is a gift left for us to unwrap. God provides glimmers of joy and the hope of eternity with Him and with those who have gone on before us.

Memories, old and new friends, new hobbies and experiences, nature, music, art, our loved ones, time for a deeper relationship with God, or even a bowl of sugar-free, low-fat ice cream are here for us to savor.

God's promises endure. Take a few Advil, put on your comfortable shoes and enjoy it.

signed all four of the great founding documents of the United States: the Continental Association, the Declaration of Independence, the Articles of Confederation, and the Constitution.

What's even more remarkable is how he got there.

Roger Sherman wasn't born into privilege. He never attended college. He began his career as a shoemaker. By candlelight and determination, he educated himself, studied law, entered public service, and eventually became one of the most influential voices in the founding of our nation.

Yet Sherman was never known for stirring speeches or commanding attention. He wasn't the loudest voice in the room. He was simply faithful...and perhaps that's why I find him so inspiring.

We live in a culture that celebrates visibility. We count followers, measure influence, and often assume that significance belongs to those standing in the spotlight. But Scripture paints a different picture. Again and again, God

works through ordinary people who quietly and faithfully do the work set before them. A shepherd boy named David. A carpenter named Joseph. Fishermen from Galilee. A tentmaker named Paul.

The Kingdom of God has always been built by people whose names may never make headlines but whose faithfulness leaves a lasting mark.

Most of us will never sign a Declaration of Independence. We won't have statues erected in our honor or our faces printed in history books. But every day we are given opportunities to shape lives, strengthen families, serve our communities, and bear witness to Christ. Roger Sherman's life reminds us that greatness is not measured by fame. It is measured by faithfulness.

As we celebrate the birth of our nation this Independence Day, perhaps we should give thanks not only for the famous founders whose names we remember, but also for the countless faithful women and men whose names history has forgotten—but whose contributions helped build something that endured. After all, some of the most important people in God's story are the ones the world never notices.
