Greed: Spiritual Hoarding

"We are not cisterns made for hoarding, we are channels made for sharing."—Billy Graham

Here is a great mystery of faith: that what is ours is not ours and that what we give away actually leads to more. It's a great paradox, to be sure. And to people like us, to people so concerned with and so steeped in scarcity, it makes no sense.

You and I were not created to store up the vast wealth of God's goodness. We were never intended to keep vast

Communion Offering to Support Trinity Service Project

Money collected during the Communion Offering on Feb. 28 and March 1 will support the Trinity Service Project, a fairly new ministry at White's Chapel Methodist Church. One hundred percent of the funds collected will go directly toward this mission.

The Trinity Service Project (TSP) exists to serve the local community by helping eligible homeowners with essential home repairs through volunteer service, at no cost to the homeowner. Guided by a

commitment to love and serve neighbors well, the ministry focuses on projects that improve safety, accessibility and livability, allowing individuals and families to remain in their homes with dignity.

TSP serves low-income residents in the community who meet specific criteria, including those who are 60 or older, individuals with disabilities, veterans or surviving spouses, first responders,

Super Saturday Returns March 7 Rise Against Hunger Event Rescheduled After Weather Delay

White's Chapel is ready to roll up its sleeves—again.

After an earlier postponement due to inclement weather, Super Saturday: Rise Against Hunger has officially been rescheduled for Saturday, March 7, from 8 to 11 a.m. in Evans Hall. While winter weather may have interrupted the original plans, it has not dampened the congregation's determination. If anything, the delay has only heightened anticipation

for this hands-on morning of service.

White's Chapel is once again partnering with Rise Against Hunger, an international hunger relief organization serving communities facing food insecurity across the globe. More than 150 volunteers will be needed to help package approximately 30,000 meals in just three hours.

The rescheduled date provides a renewed opportunity for families, small groups and individuals who may have

been unable to participate before. Church leaders hope the new March 7 gathering will bring an even stronger turnout, reinforcing the church's ongoing commitment to fighting global hunger.

Volunteers will work assembly-line style, scooping, measuring, weighing and sealing fortified meals made from rice, soy, dehydrated vegetables and essential vitamins. The shelf-stable packages are

quickly, and we need your help to continue building something truly life-giving.”

Prior to joining White's Chapel, Cooper served for 13 years with Birdville Independent School District in its Specialized Services and Supports Department—first as a music therapist and later as a special education teacher. She also continues to operate a small private practice, Mockingbird Music Therapy, providing in-home services during evenings and weekends.

A Keller resident since 1998 and a graduate of Keller High School, Cooper earned a Bachelor of Music in music therapy from Sam Houston State University in 2014. She later completed a Master of Arts in Teaching, specializing in special education, at Texas Woman's University.

Her passion for Thrive is both personal and rooted in faith.

“The world is woefully lacking in safe places,” she said. “The best thing someone can do in this world is to foster one.”

Cooper believes the church is uniquely positioned to model meaningful inclusion.

“There is a place for everyone in the church,” she said, citing Romans 15:7, which calls believers to accept one another as Christ accepted them.

The Thrive Ministry provides multiple levels of support based on individual needs. Parents may request a buddy through a brief intake form, and support levels are assessed weekly. After reviewing submitted forms, the Thrive team observes students in various settings to determine appropriate accommodations—from sensory tools and communication devices to one-on-one support during Sunday School.

Classrooms that include students in the Thrive program are equipped with sensory materials, noise-canceling headphones, fidgets and both low- and high-tech communication devices. Teachers receive individualized goals to help support each child's success.

Confidentiality remains a priority, with information shared only with parental permission and when necessary for a student's safety or benefit.

Families interested in registering for Thrive or adults who feel called to volunteer may contact Cooper directly.

Through Thrive, White's Chapel continues its commitment to creating a church where every individual is welcomed, supported and empowered to flourish.

stockpiles of grace and mercy and tenderness—like anyone can store that stuff anyway! We were designed and fashioned to give it away. Oscar Hammerstein famously wrote that love is not love until it's given away. The same can be said of gentleness and of forgiveness, and it can really be said of all of the “good stuff” of life.

For too many, though, Christianity has become a game of winners and losers, of insiders and outsiders. It's become a competition about who can look the best and sound the best as we chime in with some overused cliché. At its heart, though, faith—real faith—isn't about winning; it's about choosing to lose. It's about sharing and helping and giving. You see, ours is not a gospel of upward mobility; it's one of a downward humility. Though the path seems hard (impossible even) and lonely, it is the only sure way to God: to pray, to hope, and to work for the betterment of our neighbors.

For when we hoard the spiritual gifts that we've been given, when we refuse to share the goodness and blessings that God has bestowed, the strangest thing happens: We begin to lose them. The more and more we amass, the less and less fulfilling they become. In the end, we become embittered and lonely; our only companions: the empty prayers we offer. In that place, God can seem so distant. And we don't understand.

We wanted to be closer to God. We prayed and we opened ourselves to His presence. So often, though, what we fail to do is to receive God's goodness with a spirit of humility. When God blesses us, we have a tendency to think that it's because of something we did (or because of something we refused to do), and we can start to believe that we deserve to be blessed. We try to take ownership of something that isn't ours to own, because the things of God can never be owned; they are ours for a season so that we can use them and steward them and share them with others.



When an adult signs up, five students will be added to the final roster. If a parent of a student on the wait list registers as a work group leader, their student will automatically be added to the final roster. Because we are required to provide one work group leader for every five students, the number of students who can attend this trip is strictly determined by the number of adults who register for this role. This year, to keep work groups small, we will need adult leaders more than ever. If you have ever wanted a shot at being a hero for a week, this is definitely it!!

Crave and Intersection

Middle School students are invited to Crave, the weekly worship service for 7th and 8th grade students. Crave will be from 5:45-7 p.m. each Wednesday. High School students are invited to Intersection, the weekly worship service for students in 9-12th grade. Intersection will run from 7:30-8:45 p.m. on Wednesdays. Crave and Intersection will both be held upstairs in the Youth Space in the student education building. We are so excited about what this spring will look like and how it will help students better know and follow Jesus together with their peers.

Sunday School Unplugged

WC Students is now offering a Sunday School class during the 9:30 a.m. worship service on Sunday mornings for our Middle School students. more age-appropriate activities, while VBX participants will spend longer in their rotations at a suitable pace. Both VBS and VBX students will meet on the same days and times in separate parts

of the building. But don't wait. Registration fees are \$25 per child until May 15 and will increase to \$40 per child attending VBS or VBX. Parents of children attending VBS can sign up to volunteer using the same registration link as their children. Student volunteers (seventh through 12th grade) and adults who do not have children can sign up at wckids.org at the bottom of the registration information and select where they would like to volunteer. Free t-shirts are available for kids and volunteers; however, sizes are not guaranteed after May 15.

With many options available, be sure to register early to ensure your slot is secured. (QR code provided for your convenience!) For volunteer parents of very small children, there are options available as well. This information can be found at the bottom of the registration page.

Volunteers who choose to serve in a specific area will be required to attend mandatory training and orientation during the first week of June from 9 a.m. to noon. On June 3, guides and assistant guides will receive their training, while all other volunteer areas will follow on June 4. We are excited to monkey around the canopy alongside you and your young explorers as they march into a lifelong adventure of discovering the nature of God and His heart for us! We look forward to learning how God's nature influences our lives.

teachers, nurses or medical and hospital staff, and single heads of household with dependent children under 18 living in the home.

In other words, the ministry steps in where help is needed most—often for people who have spent their lives serving others.

For Jared Smith, Trinity coordinator, the ministry represents a deeply personal calling. "Ever since I was in middle school, mission trips have been an important part of my life and faith," Smith said. "I was always looking for opportunities to combine working with my hands and serving others, so naturally MSMT and HSMT were a huge draw for me. During college I interned for the WC Students with the goal of staying involved with missions."

While mission trips remain meaningful, Smith said there was a growing desire to serve more consistently.

"Mission trips are great, but they are only a week out of the year," he said. "There was a greater desire in me to serve more often. The idea of forming a ministry like TSP had been thrown around for years and was one of the reasons I transitioned over to the Missions Department. Fast forward a few years and I now have the opportunity to serve my local community and give congregation members a chance to as well. Not only do we get to serve, but we have the opportunity to develop longer lasting relationships instead of meeting them for

a week and never seeing them again."

The roots of Trinity Service Project trace back several years, inspired in part by Blueprint Ministries from the Men's Mission Trip in San Antonio. The concept lingered as a hopeful possibility until, as Smith described it, a pivotal meeting when leadership decided, "Enough talking about it—let's go for it."

Over the past year, the ministry has evolved from an idea and shared desire into a structured pilot program preparing to take on its first homeowner. A planning committee has been formed. Internal systems for client intake and project management have been created. Meetings have taken place with city officials and local community leaders. What was once conversation is now construction plans, volunteer coordination and real opportunity.

As TSP prepares to launch its first project, the greatest need is a strong volunteer base ready to serve when projects arise. Skilled labor is welcome, but willing hands and compassionate hearts matter just as much.

Those interested in volunteering can complete the Volunteer Interest Form available through the church.

The upcoming Communion Offering provides an opportunity for the entire congregation to participate—whether through giving, serving or praying for the families who will be impacted.

Because sometimes loving your neighbor looks like building a ramp, repairing a roof or installing a handrail.

And on Feb. 28 and March 1, every dollar placed in the Communion Offering will help make that possible.

easily prepared by adding water and are distributed through established partners in food-insecure regions.

Rise Against Hunger currently serves communities in 41 countries. In 2024 alone, the organization packaged 54.3 million meals, impacting more than 9.4 million lives. The Methodist Church recently surpassed the milestone of packaging more than 100 million meals—a number to which White's Chapel has proudly contributed.

Despite the global reach of the effort, Super Saturday maintains a distinctly local feel. Evans Hall fills with upbeat music, energetic volunteers and a


Baptism 101 Class
