A Faith Made Their Own

11 a.m. | Sanctuary**

Spring Confirmation at White's Chapel will take place Sunday, April 26, during the 11 a.m. worship service in the Sanctuary—a meaningful milestone not only for the students being confirmed, but for the entire congregation that has walked alongside them.

Confirmation is an intentional spiritual formation journey designed to guide students through the history, practices and beliefs of the Christian faith. More than a class, it is a season of discovery—one that invites students to explore what they believe, ask important questions and ultimately profess their faith in Jesus Christ. It also marks a step into a deeper understanding of what it means to be a member of White's Chapel and to live "as a faithful disciple of Jesus Christ."

This spring, a small group of students began their Confirmation journey in January. Meeting weekly, they spent time exploring topics such as the Bible, salvation and the role of the church.

For many deployed men and women, these boxes are more than supplies—they are reminders of home, of faith and of a community that has not forgotten them. Through White's Chapel's Soldier Ministry, that connection is made real, one name, one note and one package at a time.

This year isn't just any Independence Day. As the United States of America celebrates its 250th anniversary—also known as the semiquincentennial (wow! That's a mouthful!)—this monumental Fourth of July gives us an even greater reason to pause, reflect, and say thank you to the men and women who serve our country every day.

In true patriotic spirit, White's Chapel is taking that gratitude a step further by sending 250 care packages to military service members stationed in remote areas around the world. That's

Cantaré Takes the Stage Spring Concert Set

An evening of music, joy, and powerful young voices is just around the corner as White's Chapel's Cantaré Performance Youth Choir presents its spring concert on Sunday, April 26, at 5 p.m. in the Sanctuary. The concert is free and open to all.

For those not familiar with the group, Cantaré is an auditioned youth choir made up of students in fourth through 12th grades who share a passion for singing and a desire to grow both musically and spiritually. What sets Cantaré apart is not just the talent, but

the heart behind it—students committed to using their gifts to lead and inspire.

Construction Updates from Around Campus

If your Sunday morning arrival lately feels a bit like a strategic mission—cones, detours and a few extra laps included—you're not alone.

Construction is—obviously—officially underway at White's Chapel.

And while it may test our patience (and our sense of direction), it also means something meaningful is taking shape right before our eyes. In a recent conversation with White's Chapel Co-Pastors Dr. John McKellar and Dr. Todd Renner, along with Heinrich Downes, Executive Director of Operations, leaders shared updates—and a hopeful

perspective—as this next chapter begins.

A New Way In (and Around)

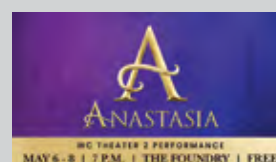
The entrance from Highway 1709 in front of the Administration Building is expected to be open in a few weeks, offering a welcome new way into the main parking areas.

Shuttle service from Rockenbaugh Elementary begins this weekend and will continue throughout construction. Golf carts will also be available across the street near the bank and throughout the main lot.

"We want to start thinking in terms of making parking better," McKellar said. And in Texas summer terms, "better" may also mean closer, quicker and slightly less time in the sun.

What's Going Up

Construction is currently focused on the Center for Spiritual Formation, with hopes of completion by August.

"That's our target right now," Downes said.

"As soon as that building is complete, we'll transition immediately into the next phase."

From there, work will begin on the new gym.

"We're excited about

what these spaces will allow us to do in the life of the church," Renner adds. "It's not just about buildings—it's about creating places where people can grow in faith and community."

Progress is also underway at La Mesa in south Fort Worth, home to White's Chapel's longtime dental clinic, where construction is visibly moving forward.

About That Garden...

The garden will be fully relocated once construction on the new building is complete. All plants, perennials and memorial elements will be carefully moved before the current space is cleared.

"It's going to take a lot of water and prayer," McKellar said.

Likely both... generously applied.

"Please pay attention to the signage and stay out of construction areas," Downes said. "Those boundaries are there to keep everyone safe and allow the work to move forward on schedule."

Parking may be tight. This is Texas. It will be hot.

The only thing we can control is the way we show up for one another.

"Be upbeat. Be welcoming. Be happy," Renner said. "Be the friendly family we know this church is."

A smile, a wave or helping someone find a space may seem small—but those moments matter.

Because long after construction is complete, people won't remember the cones.

They'll remember how they were treated in the middle of them.

We'll continue sharing updates so you can stay informed on what's happening across campus. Thank you for your patience, flexibility and the spirit you bring—even in the heat—as we build what's next together.

250 reminders that they are seen, appreciated, and never forgotten.

Each box will be filled with practical items, comfort favorites and handwritten notes of encouragement—because it's the thought and sentiment behind each box that truly makes a difference. For those serving far from home, these simple acts of care become powerful reminders that they are seen, supported and not forgotten.

And here's the best part: this is something we get to do together.

With a goal this big, there are plenty of ways to jump in. Donate items, decorate boxes, write cards, or help pack. Whether you come solo or bring your whole crew, every contribution helps carry a little piece of home across the miles.

Work sessions are TBA, but don't wait to get involved—because July 4 is closer than you think—and getting these boxes into the hands of the right heroes takes a little time (and a lot of heart).

Groups are especially encouraged to participate. Sunday school classes, Bible studies, families, and friends can all take part in purchasing items, decorating boxes, and writing notes. It's a meaningful way to serve together—and maybe even create a few memories along the way.

The donation list (a link to the Sign-Up Genius list is printed at the end of this article) includes everyday essentials and morale boosters like socks, wipes,

disinfecting supplies, bandages, lip balm, cough drops, peanut butter packs, cookies, trail mix, snack bars, and drink mixes—items that bring both comfort and care to those serving far from home.

All donated items should be returned by Sunday, May 3 to the collection boxes near Evans Hall or the Administration Building, with gift cards delivered to the front office.

And while the items themselves are important, the impact goes far beyond what fits in a box.

We often receive thank-you notes from service members, and they're the kind you read more than once: Notes that remind us just how much it matters to feel remembered—especially when you're far from everything familiar.

So whether you donate, decorate, pack, or simply write a note, know this: you are sending more than a package. You are sending encouragement, gratitude, and a reminder that home is cheering them on.

This Fourth of July, as we celebrate 250 years of freedom, let's send 250 reasons to smile—one box, one note, one act of gratitude at a time.

Here's what 250 boxes can do: Notes from the Field

A box packed here.

A note written with care.

A reminder delivered right on time.

Sometimes the most meaningful part of a care package isn't what's inside—it's the reminder that someone back home cares.

Here are two recent notes from service members who received White's Chapel care packages:

"I am one of the soldiers who received your packages and cards. A few of us here received them, and I can say they definitely helped improve morale! I even have people in my office snagging snacks as I type this. The cards were very thoughtful, and we are all so grateful.

This is such a great way to help us feel connected to fellowship and God's people across the world. I'm a 23-year-old Army

officer, currently serving in Kosovo with the Florida National Guard. I'm married and missing my husband, who is also deployed. Thank you for reminding us we're not alone."

"I am attached to Alpha Troop, 1-153rd out of North Florida. Today, we received Easter boxes—what a blessing. Not just for me, but for soldiers all around us. These truly were Texas-sized boxes.

Your prayers and acts of kindness are not lost on us. I've had the opportunity to share my faith with others here, and your encouragement fuels that work more than you know. On Easter, I read Scripture with three fellow soldiers—what a gift to reflect on the empty tomb together.

Thank you for living out your faith. Please continue to pray for us."

Because the spring session is more intimate than the fall, students had the unique opportunity to grow together in small groups—creating space for thoughtful conversation, honest questions and meaningful connections.

"These smaller groups allow students to really process what they're learning and make it personal," said Denise Bennett, co-director of WC Kids. "They build relationships that often last well beyond the classroom."

In the Methodist tradition, Confirmation holds special significance. While many students were baptized as infants or young children, Confirmation represents the moment when that early foundation of faith becomes something they personally claim.

"When we baptize infants, it's just the beginning of their faith journey," Bennett said. "Confirmation is when that faith—

first nurtured by parents, family and the church—becomes their own. This is a time when young people are offered the opportunity to truly claim what they believe."

On Confirmation Sunday, 10 students will publicly affirm their faith, taking an important step forward in their walk with Christ. It is both a personal commitment and a communal celebration—a reminder that the church plays an active role in encouraging and supporting the faith of the next generation.

"Confirmation has the power to be a life-changing moment," Bennett said. "Through each week of learning, building relationships and even having fun, students begin to understand what it really means to follow Jesus. They're not just preparing for the future—they're being equipped to live out their faith right now."

The congregation is invited to be part of this special service—celebrating these students, praying for them and affirming the promises made alongside them.

As we wrap up the semester and head into the summer months, we're celebrating with a fun-filled evening featuring inflatable water slides and plenty of pizza. All middle school students are invited to join us on April 29 from 5:45–7 p.m. for a

night of fun, connection and community. It's a great opportunity to celebrate all that God has done this semester and give students one more chance to laugh, connect and make lasting memories together.

Senior Night

Each year, during our final Intersection of the school year, WC Students sets aside intentional time to honor and celebrate our graduating seniors. This special moment allows us to reflect on their journey through the ministry—remembering the ways they've grown in their faith, built lasting friendships and become leaders within our student community. This year, our Senior Night will be held on April 29 during Intersection from 7:30–8:45 p.m.

As a student ministry, we take time to speak encouragement over them and pray for them as they prepare to step into this next season of life beyond WC Students. While it's always bittersweet to say goodbye, it's also a meaningful opportunity to send them out with support, reminding them that they are known, loved and equipped for what lies ahead—and that they will always have a home at White's Chapel and within WC Students.

Golf Tournament

This past weekend, White's Chapel hosted another successful Open Golf Tournament, continuing a nearly two-decade tradition through the Men's Ministry. This event plays a vital role in supporting WC Students as they prepare for summer mission trips, helping offset costs and making it more attainable for students to serve and experience God's work firsthand.

Many students also serve at the tournament to raise support for their own trips. London Petrosky shared that it "combines two of my favorite things—people I love and golf" while helping him connect with others. Cadence Loesch described mission trips as "a week filled with serving others through Christ," adding that the tournament "makes the biggest difference for WC students like me." Reid Black called the mission trip "my favorite week of the year" and a time he feels "closest to God," while Reese Beall shared that it's "the best week of my year" and a chance to "serve those in need and spread God's love."

At the heart of Fanny Crosby's poetry and hymns was her love for and faith in Jesus Christ. In many cases, a composer would simply play a tune and ask her, "What does the melody say to you?" So full of scripture and Spirit was she, that simple, captivating, evangelistic lyrics that touched hearts and pointed souls to Christ would immediately pour forth. As a Methodist, her Wesleyan theology shone through her compositions, but perhaps, none more so than Blessed Assurance with its images of prevenient grace, "visions of heaven," "echoes of mercy," and continual praise for her Savior.

Someone has said of lyrics, "While melody may be the invitation, lyrics are why we stay. They are the voice in your head, the phrase you remember years later, the stanza that carried you through heartbreak." Surely, recognizing our blessings—whether we find ourselves in adversity, excess, or somewhere in between—is the essence of that abundant life Jesus has promised us. In this season, perhaps the real question is: what song is our life singing? Like Fanny Crosby, we may not choose our circumstances, but we can choose the lens through which we see them. When our hearts are anchored in Christ, even life's hardships can become hymns of praise. May we, too, learn to see with the eyes of faith—allowing every word on our lips, every note of our lives to testify to the goodness, blessing, and grace of our Savior.

For those unfamiliar with the name, Fanny Crosby was born in 1820, but within the first two months of her life was rendered blind due to treatment prescribed by a man posing as a doctor. Yet, until her death almost ninety-five years later, she wrote more than 9,000 hymns, eight cantatas, five popular songs, and four books of poetry. Her first lines of poetry were written at the age of eight, and capture her lifelong viewpoint:

*Oh, what a happy soul I am,
although I cannot see!
I am resolved that in this world
contented I will be.
How many blessings I enjoy that
other people don't.
To weep and sigh because I'm blind
I cannot, and I won't!*

Indeed, despite the adversity of losing her sight and her father within a year of her birth, Fanny chose to live life to its fullest—writing poetry, zealously memorizing Scripture, and pursuing her education at the New York Institute for the Blind where she subsequently taught. By the age of twenty-three, she passionately represented the interests of the blind before Congress and ultimately became influential in the spiritual lives of, or a friend to, Presidents Martin Van Buren, John Tyler, James K. Polk, and Grover Cleveland.

Southlake Town Square's "Home for the Holidays" to participating in the Christmas Worship Experience and singing in numerous church services, Cantaré has made its presence known both on campus and beyond. both their dedication and the strength of the program.

For Hughes, the impact goes far beyond music.

"Watching these students grow both musically and spiritually has been an incredible blessing," she said. "My prayer is that through this choir, each student not only becomes a stronger musician and singer but also discovers how to use their voice and lives to be a light."

As the final concert of the season approaches, this performance offers a chance to celebrate not only a year of hard work, but the voices—and hearts—of a remarkable group of students.

The process is designed to be simple, welcoming and encouraging. Each student participates in a brief, 10-minute private audition where they will sing a few vocal exercises, perform "The Star-Spangled Banner," and share a song of their choice. No formal musical training is required—just a love for singing and a willingness to learn.

Cantaré rehearses weekly on Tuesday evenings and performs throughout the year in church services, concerts and community events. Beyond building strong vocal technique, the program emphasizes confidence, leadership and spiritual growth.

Led by Director Teresa Hughes, along with Kandice Whitehead and Dr. Julie

Rawls, the Cantaré team is passionate about investing in young musicians and helping them discover how their voices can make an impact.

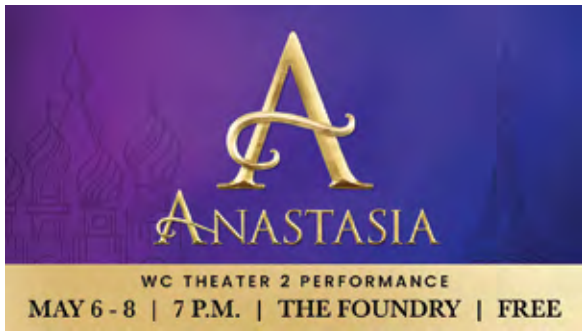
