spreads the Gospel and teaches scripture. They work with local churches to create safe, fun environments to disciple future generations.

“We know kids learn best through fun and play,” shares Hanna Robbins, WC Kids Co-Director. “My husband, Sam, often quotes one of his favorite preachers, Fred Craddock, ‘It is a grave sin to bore people with the Bible.’ We work diligently at White’s Chapel to make the Bible accessible, to show that it is relatable, and to study it in engaging and memorable ways...Triumph Sports fits right into our vision.”

From June 29th to July 2, Triumph Sports Camps partnered with WC Kids to host two multi-sport camps. The first camp featured athletic games like Kickball and Capture the Flag, along with sports such as Basketball, Flag Football, and Soccer. Kids age 5 to 12 enjoyed games, challenges, and friendly competitions over four days from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., making friends and learning life lessons. Simultaneously,

Triumph hosted a Dodgeball camp for the same age group.

“I am so impressed with the staff of Triumph,” exclaims Robbins, “Each adult and teen working was energetic, positive, detail-oriented, and full of the joy of the Lord. A New Season for WC Students

As we look ahead to the fall semester, we are excited for a new season of WC Students! As our ministry continues to grow, we are always evaluating how we can best serve our students and families while creating meaningful opportunities for discipleship, community and service. Our mission remains the same: to help every student take their next step in following Jesus. This fall, we are making a few intentional changes to our ministry schedule and structure that we believe will better support our students and create more opportunities for them to grow in their faith.

**Middle School Worship:
A New Time, A Familiar Mission**

Beginning Sunday, Aug. 23, our middle school gathering, formerly known as Crave, will now be called Middle School Worship and will meet on Sundays (location to be announced!) from 4:30–6 p.m.* Middle School Worship is designed specifically for seventh- and eighth-graders and provides a place for students to build friendships, worship together, hear Biblical teaching and connect in small groups led by high school student leaders.

This change was made to better accommodate the busy schedules of our middle school students. By moving to Sunday afternoons, we hope to create a consistent gathering time where more students can participate, grow in their faith and stay connected to our ministry.

**Sunday Mornings:
Discipleship and Ownership**

Our Sunday morning ministry is designed to help students take their next step in following Jesus through both discipleship and service. At 9:30 a.m., seventh- through ninth-grade students will gather for Sunday school with Biblical teaching and small-group discussion designed for their stage of life. Students in 10th through 12th grades will have the opportunity to serve throughout the church in ministries such as WC Kids, WC Students, Thrive, Operations and more.

Before serving, high school students will gather for a brief weekly huddle to pray, receive encouragement and prepare for the morning. At 11 a.m., students are invited to worship with the Student Ministry Team in either the Sanctuary service or the Foundry service.

Through these changes, we hope students will not only grow in their own

faith but also discover how God can use them to serve others and be an active part of the church.

High School Bible Studies: Growing Together in Faith and Community

This fall, our high school small groups, formerly known as Cell Groups, will now be called High School Bible Studies. Meeting on Sundays at 6:30 p.m., these groups are designed to help students grow deeper in their faith while building authentic, Christ-centered friendships. Students will gather in gender-specific groups for meaningful discussion, intentional discipleship and lasting community.

Girl Dinner brings high school girls together to share a meal, study God’s Word and learn from young adult women who are investing in the next generation. Manistry creates a space for high school guys to connect through activities and conversation before diving into Scripture, with a focus on accountability, spiritual growth and authentic relationships.

Whether students are looking for deeper friendships, Biblical community or encouragement in their walk with Christ, High School Bible Studies are a wonderful place to belong and grow.

We are excited for all that God has in store for WC Students this fall! While some things may look different, our heart remains the same: creating spaces where students can know Jesus, grow in their faith, build meaningful relationships and discover their place in the church.

***Pardon Our Progress: Flexibility Required!**

And because this is a season of exciting changes at White’s Chapel, flexibility may just become our newest spiritual gift! As construction begins on our new Student Ministry building and the current space is reconfigured to make more room for WC Kids, WC Students may be on the move from time to time. We appreciate everyone’s patience and willingness to roll with us over the next few months. After all, a little dust, a few detours and an occasional change of scenery are all part of making room for something exciting ahead!

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them into something that ultimately brings Him glory.

I was recently reminded of this while reading about the song “Turn! Turn! Turn!” Written explicitly for the purpose of becoming a commercial success in the folk music scene of the 1960s, it catapulted the rock band The Byrds to international fame and was later recorded by Dolly Parton. What made the song so appealing? The lyrics were taken straight from Ecclesiastes 3:1–8, with the title words being among the few not taken directly from Scripture. As a result, God’s truth has been carried through the airwaves and sung by millions around the world, proclaiming that there truly is a time and season for everything.

While Ecclesiastes’ author also tells us, “There’s nothing new under the sun,” I prefer the encouraging promises of the Apostle Paul in 2 Corinthians 5: “If anyone is in Christ, there is a NEW creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God. ...” In Ephesians 2:10, he identifies us as “God’s workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works,

which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.”

Just as Ecclesiastes proclaims there’s a time to love and a time for peace, so Pastors John and Todd have recently challenged us to a great awakening with the words of Ephesians 5: “Wake up, sleeper, rise from the dead, and Christ will shine on you!”

And isn’t it time?

God has set the stage. When we applaud the unity inspired by events such as the FIFA World Cup and experience it in a sanctuary filled with those gathered for worship, we get a glimpse of God’s desire for all humanity. When we recognize the great ideals on which America was founded and bear witness to those who exchange their personal dream for the sake of a greater hope, we are reminded that our choices matter and our lives can make an eternal difference.

And isn’t it time?

Time not only to wake up, but to pray up. Time to rise up. Time to show up for the cause of Christ and for the purposes for which we were created. I look forward to seeing the families come in with their blankets and pillows; It’s always fun seeing how each of them sets up their space to enjoy the show together.”

It might be a “kid” movie you can stream at home, but why not enjoy cinematic excitement with the entire family? Meet other families and watch a fun film together! To ensure there are enough snacks and supplies, please register online.

Lastly, pop on over to WC Kids’ annual Bubble Bash on Aug. 1, from 10 a.m. to noon! This bubble-filled morning will have awesome water features, outdoor playground fun and delicious summer refreshments.

This year, we will have two water slides, one large 24-foot slide and one smaller 6-foot slide for our younger kids. Kona Ice will be on-site to provide snow cones to cool off, and new this year, Tom’s traveling coffee truck will be there to fuel up our adults, serving coffee and juice.”

Each of these events offers a wonderful opportunity to strengthen family bonds by sharing meaningful moments. The hope is to create inviting, low-pressure activities that make it easy for families to connect, have fun and create beautiful memories that last all year long.

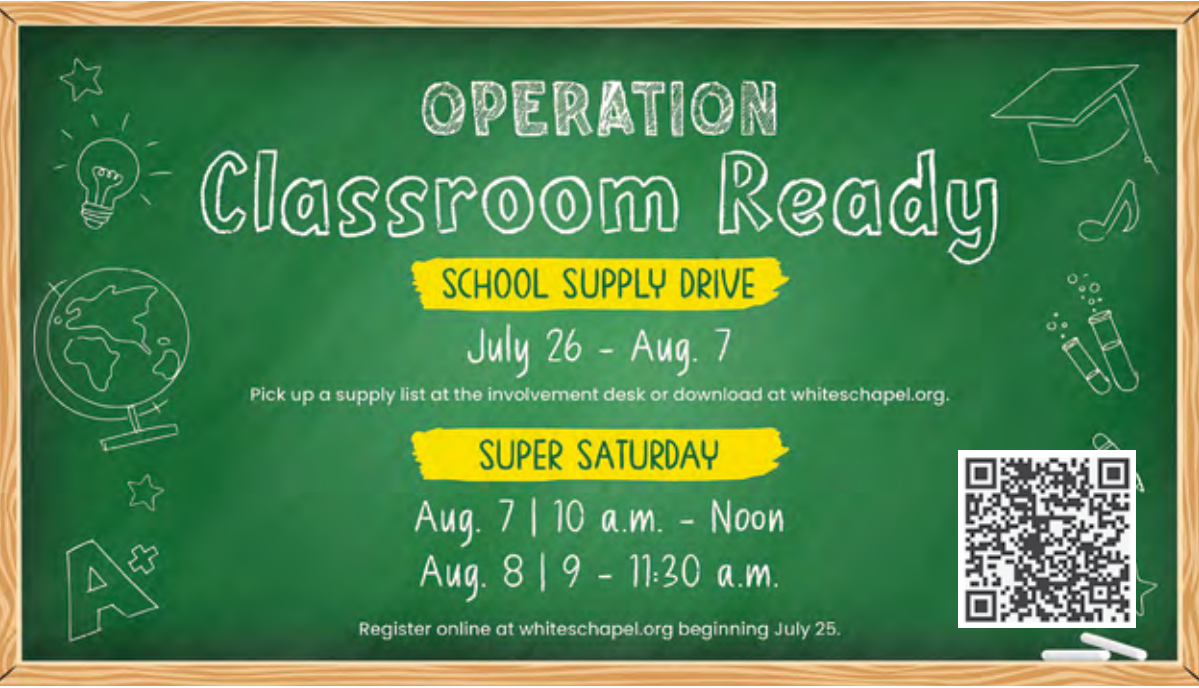
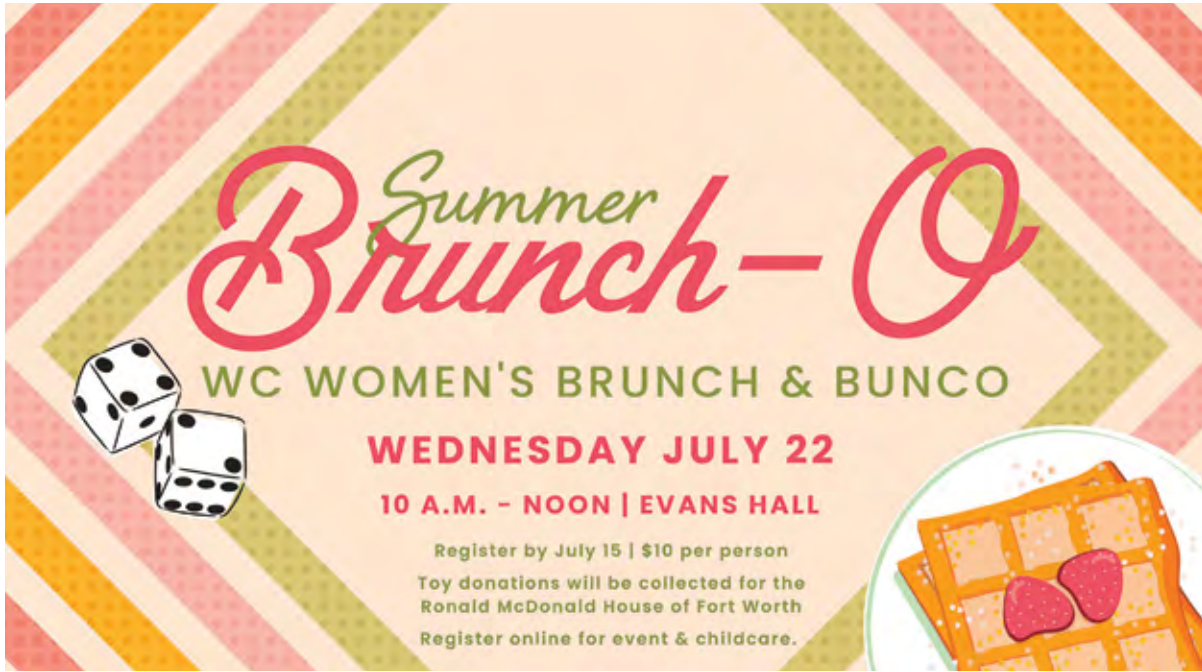
