Grace Chapel to Resound with Beethoven and Brahms

Date: Sunday, June 14 | 5 p.m.

From the gentle lyricism of Brahms to the fiery intensity of Beethoven, an upcoming concert at White's Chapel promises an evening filled with beauty, passion and unforgettable artistry.

On Sunday, June 14, at 5 p.m., the Apex Arts League will present "Beethoven and Brahms Duos" in White's Chapel's Grace Chapel.

Featuring internationally acclaimed musicians Swang Lin on violin and Angelo Rondello on piano, the performance will showcase two beloved masterworks from the chamber music repertoire.

Together, the two compositions offer audiences a musical journey that moves from reflection and intimacy to passion and virtuosity.

The evening opens with Johannes Brahms's Violin Sonata No. 1 in G major, often called the "Rain Sonata." Known for its warmth, tenderness and sweeping melodies, the piece reflects Brahms's deeply emotional and introspective style. Inspired in part by his own song "Regenlied" ("Rain Song"), the sonata carries a sense of nostalgia and quiet beauty that has captivated audiences for generations.

In contrast, the concert concludes with Ludwig van Beethoven's famous "Kreutzer" Sonata, a work celebrated for its dramatic power, technical brilliance and emotional intensity. Bold and

Communion Offering Supports Smiles, Health, and Hope

At White's Chapel, Communion has always been about more than a moment at the altar. It is a reminder that Christ's love was given freely—and that we are called to carry that love into the world through compassion, generosity and service.

This month, the Communion offering will support one of White's Chapel's most hands-on ministries: the Mission Health Center Dental Clinic, a ministry that has

quietly transformed lives in southeast Fort Worth since opening in 2017.

Located near La Mesa Methodist Church and T.A. Sims Elementary School, the clinic was founded with a simple but powerful purpose—to care for working families and individuals who often fall through the cracks of traditional healthcare systems. For many patients,

Construction Update

Why, yes! The driveway is open!!

If the past several months at White's Chapel have felt like a live-action obstacle course of fencing, detours and creative parking decisions—with occasional cameos by orange cones that seemed to multiply overnight—there is finally some good news: many of the most disruptive phases of construction are beginning to move into the rearview mirror.

And for the first time, the campus is beginning to look less like a construction zone and more like the vision church leaders first shared many months ago.

According to Executive Director of Operations Heinrich Downes, major progress was made throughout May on the new Center for Spiritual Care. Concrete work and foundational projects that created much of the recent traffic

disruption are now largely complete, and crews have shifted their focus upward.

By early June, first-floor framing is expected to be substantially finished, with second-floor work already underway.

"We're fast tracking," Downes said. "Things are continuing to move forward."

Listen Up!

A few years ago, after preaching a Saturday night service, I stopped by a local BBQ place for dinner. It was called Pickles—and it was Karaoke night. Sadly it's no longer in business. But that night I was exhausted, hungry, and honestly a little grumpy. The restaurant was loud, the karaoke was blaring, and I was mostly focused on finishing the mountain of brisket I'd ordered. Then I heard a commotion near the stage.

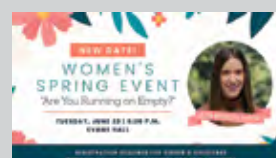
At first, I ignored it. I tuned it out. But eventually my wife encouraged me to look up. When I did I saw a little girl—maybe eight or nine years old, standing at the microphone trying to sing the Miley Cyrus summer anthem "Party in the USA." As soon as the music started, she froze. Tears welled up in her eyes. She started shaking with fear.

What happened next surprised me. Instead of letting her walk off stage embarrassed, the entire restaurant began cheering her on. People started singing with her. Slowly, her voice grew stronger. Before long, the whole place was singing together. People were dancing, laughing, standing on chairs, and encouraging this terrified little girl

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a visit to the clinic represents the first dental care they have ever received.

Since its founding, the clinic has completed nearly 3,000 appointments and provided more than \$3.5 million in free dental care to the surrounding community.

Behind those numbers are countless stories of relief, dignity and renewed confidence.

A parent finally able to smile without pain. A child receiving treatment before a small problem became a crisis. A worker returning to a job interview with restored confidence. Through something as practical as dental care, lives are being changed every week.

The clinic exists because of an extraordinary network of volunteers and supporters who continue saying "yes" to the mission.

Greg Eveland oversees the center, while Dr. Greg Wright serves as the chief dentist. Licensed dentists, hygienists and dental assistants donate their time, skills and equipment to provide professional care at no charge to patients. Abigail Martinez manages the day-to-day operations of the clinic, coordinating appointments and helping bridge relationships between volunteers and the community they serve.

Consistent volunteers who help sustain the ministry include Sadeed and Casey Attar, Mack Snead, Jean Tuggey, Kim Westmoreland, Cindy Wright and Dr. Greg Wright, along with many other dental professionals and church members who generously give their time and talents to serve the community.

Even the building itself tells a story of ministry.

White's Chapel's "Dirty Dozen"—volunteers skilled in construction, plumbing, electrical work and maintenance—helped transform a neighboring building into a fully certified dental clinic. What once was simply extra space became a place of healing and hope.

The vision for the clinic began in 2015, when Dr. John McKellar began encouraging church leaders and members to consider how White's Chapel could do more for the working poor in the DFW area. White's Chapel already had a strong relationship with what was then El Buen Samaritano United Methodist Church and neighboring T.A. Sims Elementary School, but leaders sensed God calling them toward something deeper and more sustainable.

After visiting the Church Health Center in Memphis, Tennessee, and studying ministries already serving vulnerable communities, a team of church staff and lay leaders began exploring the greatest needs in the La Mesa neighborhood. Dental care quickly rose to the top.

What followed was a church-wide effort fueled by prayer, generosity and willing hands.

Volunteers renovated the clinic space. Donations helped purchase supplies and equipment. Dental professionals offered their expertise. Slowly, what began as an idea became a thriving ministry.

And the need continues to grow.

Today, one of the clinic's greatest needs is additional licensed dental professionals willing to volunteer. The commitment is flexible—as little as three hours per quarter—with appointments scheduled around volunteers' availability during weekdays, evenings or Saturdays.

In a world where many people feel overlooked or forgotten, this ministry offers something deeply personal: care, compassion and the reminder that they matter to God.

As White's Chapel prepares to receive Communion this month, the congregation is invited to remember that the table of Christ has always been connected to service.

The bread and cup remind us not only of grace received, but grace shared.

One hundred percent of June's Communion offerings will go directly to support the Mission Health Center Dental Clinic and its ongoing ministry to the community.

And sometimes, hope begins with something as simple as a smile.

and enjoy some much-needed fun.

On Tuesday, July 14, at 6:30 p.m., WCYA will host a Game Night packed with a variety of games for all skill levels and interests.

"We'll have board games, card games and video games to play together," de Groot said. "There will be food as well. If you have a game you'd like to bring to game night, that would be awesome. All games are welcome."

Whether you are a fan of Uno, Mario Kart, Monopoly or Yahtzee, the night is designed to provide a relaxed, low-pressure environment where friendships can grow naturally through laughter and shared experiences.

"These events are designed to give us dedicated time to just chat with each other, play and spend time getting to know each other in a more casual and less structured setting," de Groot said. "Some of the best friendships have been made at our summer social events. We're looking forward to spending time together. Friendship with fellow believers is so important, and we try hard to find time to build those friendships."

Registration is not required for either event, and both are free. All that is needed is you. Don't let summer pass by without making meaningful memories and new friendships along the way.

The concert will be performed in the intimate setting of Grace Chapel, a venue well-suited for chamber music and known for its warm acoustics. The pairing of world-class musicians with a close-up listening environment creates an experience that allows audiences to fully appreciate the depth and artistry of the music.

Lin, a native of Taipei, Taiwan, began studying violin at age 6 and later trained with renowned violinist Zvi Zeitlin at the Eastman School of Music. He currently serves as associate concertmaster of

the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra and has performed with major orchestras including the Dallas Symphony, Houston Symphony, Orchestra of St. Luke's and Orpheus Chamber Orchestra.

His career has taken him across the United States, Europe and Asia, with concerto appearances and performances featured on NPR's "Performance Today," PBS and "Good Morning America." Lin performs on the historic "Eugenie, ex-Mackenzie" Antonio Stradivari violin, crafted in 1685 and generously loaned to the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra Association by an anonymous patron.

Rondello is an acclaimed pianist and founder of the Seattle Music Exchange, an organization dedicated to fostering cultural connection through concerts, educational programs and artistic collaborations around the world.

explained. “They are fast tracking that as well.”

Looking ahead, church leadership hopes the new Center for Spiritual Care will be occupied by September. Plans currently call for demolition of the old SC farmhouse shortly afterward, though not before useful materials are carefully removed and repurposed.

Some functioning air conditioning units from the older building, for example, are expected to be sent to the La Mesa campus to help reduce ministry costs there—proving once again that at White's Chapel, even air conditioners may eventually get mission opportunities.

For Downes, one of the most encouraging parts of the process has been the attitude and partnership of the construction crews themselves.

“We're not trying to build a Taj Mahal,” he said. “We're trying to build a building that's feasible and user-friendly and cost-effective.”

He praised contractors for helping the church remain mindful of stewardship while still delivering quality work—and noted that some crew members have even begun attending church events and services along the way.

“They've really tried to understand what White's Chapel is about,” Downes said.

So, while a few orange cones may remain for a while longer—perhaps clinging to campus like longtime church members reluctant to leave after the benediction—the campus is steadily transitioning from disruption to definition, and the future is beginning to come into focus.

Construction

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One of the biggest improvements for members arriving on campus may be the reopening of the driveway near the construction area—a development many drivers have been eagerly awaiting after weeks of navigating cones, barricades, alternate routes and what sometimes felt like an advanced-level church parking simulation.

Of course, Texas weather always gets a vote.

“Everything's dependent on the weather,” Downes said with a laugh. “Just like Texas.”

Now that much of the heavy groundwork is complete, attention is beginning to turn toward the campus exterior and surrounding spaces.

Landscaping crews are expected to begin smoothing completed areas, laying sod and preparing garden spaces throughout the summer. In other words, the dirt piles are slowly giving way to actual grass—always a reassuring sign.

Additional parking improvements are also underway.

Construction has already begun on a retaining wall project that will allow approximately 60 new parking spaces to be added near the back parking areas. Once completed, crews will pave the new section and continue improving traffic flow across campus.

“There are two different construction teams going at this time,” Downes

until she found her confidence. By the end she was owning that tiny stage.

And sitting there in that noisy BBQ joint, I realized something important. I almost missed a holy moment **because I wasn't really listening.**

I mean obviously I would've **heard** the music no matter what. I may have noticed the crowd getting louder. But I could have completely missed the beauty of what was happening if I hadn't stopped to truly listen.

That distinction is at the center of 1 Samuel 3, where young Samuel hears God call his name in the night. At first, he thinks Eli, his mentor, is calling him. Three times Samuel runs to Eli, unsure of what he is hearing. Finally, Eli understands that God is speaking and tells Samuel, “If he calls again, say, ‘Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening.’” Samuel obeys and moves from merely hearing to truly listening.

There's a difference between the two.

Hearing is automatic. Listening is intentional. Hearing happens with our ears. Listening requires our attention. Hearing is passive. Listening is active. In so many ways, our world has become very bad at listening. And when we stop listening, we risk missing God.

One of the most valuable things I learned in seminary counseling classes was the practice of active listening. It

sounds simple, but it's difficult. The goal is to listen so carefully that the other person feels fully heard- not rushed, interrupted, or dismissed.

When I've applied that tool what has shocked me is how healing it can be. As humbling as it is, oftentimes people don't actually need my profound pastoral advice. They just need someone to listen. They begin talking through a problem and gradually discover clarity on their own simply because someone's there. **There is power in listening.**

I remember a young man who attended Saturday worship services regularly. He always stood during the music with his arms crossed and a serious expression on his face. For months I assumed he disliked worship... or disliked me.

Then one day while we were talking he explained that he worked as a sound engineer and loved listening to the voices around him during worship. He told me that was how he experienced the Holy Spirit. Not by singing loudly but by quietly listening.

So the challenge is simple. **Talk less and listen more.** Listen to the people around you. Listen carefully enough that others feel seen, valued, and loved. Listen for God in unexpected places.

Because He is speaking. Through Scripture. Through worship. Sometimes through a friend who needs our attention. And sometimes through a frightened little girl singing karaoke in a crowded BBQ restaurant.

So be ready to say: **“Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening.”**
