Helping Hands in Nepal

Imagine facing a world where your hands no longer do what they were created to do—where simple tasks like buttoning a shirt, tying a shoe, or lifting a spoon become nearly impossible. For many in Janakpur, Nepal, this isn't a passing thought but daily reality. Their hands bear the scars of leprosy, burns, injuries, or birth defects—leaving them to navigate life with unimaginable challenges.

Lalgadh Centre operates nearly a hundred inpatient beds and treats more than a hundred thousand outpatients each year—including thousands of children.

For about six years, White's Chapel has designated one of its communion offerings to support Lalgadh Leprosy Hospital and Services Centre (LLHSC) in Nepal's Dhanusha District. This December's offering will once again go toward that vital and heart-breaking cause, ensuring that every dollar given reaches those in need.

Although known primarily as a leprosy hospital, Lalgadh provides far more than specialized care for those affected by the disease. Each year, tens of thousands of patients are treated there for a wide range of illnesses including malaria, meningitis, malnutrition, tuberculosis, typhoid, cholera, respiratory infections, and parasitic diseases.

As one of the world's busiest leprosy hospitals, Lalgadh Centre operates nearly a hundred inpatient beds and treats more than a hundred thousand outpatients each year—including

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"Now and Always:" A Year Later, the Vision Comes to Life

It's hard to believe it's already been a full year since White's Chapel launched the "Now and Always" campaign. Back then, we invited our church family to imagine what God might build through us—to dream big, give boldly and look ahead with hope. And as often happens with big dreams, much of the first year has unfolded quietly in the background: architects redrawing plans, ministry teams offering thoughtful feedback and patient crews navigating city approvals one form at a time.

On Nov. 10, Co-Pastors Dr. John McKellar and Dr. Todd Renner sat down to reflect on where we've been and what's coming next. Their conversation was honest and hopeful, sprinkled with

the kind of pastor humor that makes you feel as if you're sitting at the table with them.

La Mesa: Finally Breaking Ground

The first project ready to launch is La Mesa, and after months of waiting on approvals and signatures, construction begins any day now.

"We are excited about getting La Mesa underway," McKellar said, clearly relieved to finally share the news. "We can't wait to keep everyone updated about this much-anticipated project."

It's the kind of milestone that lifts the whole church—like we collectively exhaled after holding our breath for far too long.

When Plans Grow Because the Church Has

Another theme that emerged this year is simple: growth. Everywhere. Programs are expanding, attendance is climbing and space needs are shifting. Because of that, nearly every building in the original campaign booklet has grown or changed in some way.

"As we said from the beginning, we have limited campus space," McKellar noted. "We need to dream for the future the best we can. And literally every project in the dream booklet has grown. They've expanded to meet the needs."

These updated ideas will be presented to the congregation and church leadership in 2026.

A Season of Music, Mission, and Meaning



Angel Tree Forest Oct. 15–Dec. 7 The Concourse & Online

In a year when many have lost jobs, food prices have soared, and hope feels elusive for more and more of our neighbors, the Angel Tree Forest stands as a powerful reminder of giving and generosity.

Once again, the trees have taken root throughout the halls of White's Chapel, filling the concourse with color, compassion, and Christmas spirit. Each tree represents a unique outreach area—offering opportunities to support individuals and families in crisis and allowing participants to give in ways that align with their own passions for service.

Now in its 18th year, this cherished White's Chapel tradition continues to

grow. Families and individuals are invited to "adopt an angel," purchase the listed items, and return them to the church by December 7. Typical angel tags include the name of the recipient and an item to purchase, with suggested costs ranging from \$25 to \$35. For those who prefer to participate from home, virtual angel trees are also available online.

Those who may not have time to shop can still share in the spirit of giving—gift

certificates from Walmart or Target are always welcome and will be thoughtfully distributed to those in need.

Beyond gift purchases, volunteers are always needed to sort, organize, and deliver donations—helping ensure each gift finds its way to someone who truly needs it this holiday season. The church partners with numerous community

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thousands of children. The hospital serves an area of roughly six million people, managing Nepal's national leprosy program for its region while also caring for patients with a wide range of other illnesses. Its **Community Outreach program** supports more than a hundred Self-Help Groups across nearby districts, offering education, social support, and vocational training. In addition, Lalgadh runs a robust training program for government health workers, doctors, and international students—all part of its mission to deliver compassionate, high-quality preventive, curative, and rehabilitative health care to those who need it most.

One of the most remarkable efforts at Lalgadh is the annual **"Hand-Reconstructive Surgery Bash,"** an intense 8- to 10-day mission led by visiting specialist **Dr. Donald**

Sammut and his team from the UK. While local doctors perform reconstructive surgeries year-round, the most complex cases require the expertise of Dr. Sammut's team. Each year, children, teenagers, adults, and the elderly travel for days—from the high mountains

of Nepal and the distant Terai plains, even from across the Indian border—for what may be their one and only chance to regain the use of their hands. Sometimes it's hard to grasp how far a few dollars dropped into a communion basket can reach. But at Lalgadh, those gifts quite literally change lives. They restore not just hands, but dignity, independence, and hope.

The Nepal Leprosy Trust, a Christian organization, oversees the hospital. Its mission extends far beyond medicine—serving those who are ill, needy, disabled, and marginalized by providing health care, rehabilitation, education, and community development.

Your offering will, additionally, help ensure that this ministry of healing continues—restoring hands, restoring lives, and restoring hope.

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One of the most exciting examples is the proposed Spiritual Care and Formation Center. The newest plans include a welcoming parlor for gatherings of 50 to 60 people, refreshed areas for AA and counseling ministries, and a 400-square-foot workshop designed for hands-on ministries and outreach. If approved, groundbreaking could begin in early 2026.



these buildings, we will give them away and wear them out.' And that's exactly what we've done."

Children touching walls? Youth filling rooms? Ministries stretching every inch of space? Perfect. That means we're doing exactly what we set out to do.

"The worst thing would be to build something so nice we don't want the children to touch it," McKellar said. "We want to wear it out. We want to break it so we can fix it."

Renner echoed that mission-centered clarity:

"We have tried to remain true to our initial objectives for this campaign:

- **Help La Mesa build a community center to foster and develop the ministry underway in East Fort Worth**
- **Provide exciting new spaces for our children and youth that will help grow disciples for the future**
- **Renovate our sanctuary to improve the temporary fixes we have made through the years and to make it accessible and safe for our choir and orchestra**
- **Renovate the Foundry to provide greater capacity for our growing ministries**

We think the changes that are being formulated will better help us fulfill those campaign goals than the initial concepts."

There's Still Time to Join In

With new families joining every month, many are asking how to participate.

"There's a digital pledge card on the homepage," Renner said. "People keep asking, 'When can I start paying my pledge?' Anytime. Anytime."

McKellar added: "It is not too late. And the more folks we have, the better this becomes."

As construction begins and plans continue to take shape, there's a growing sense of gratitude—mixed with the kind of excitement that naturally comes when God is clearly at work.

"We love this "Now and Always" dream," McKellar said. "God is doing a great work now, but we are so excited about the future and how the Lord will use us to bless what's coming."

And that's where we stand today: in a season of possibility, holding the same hope that launched this campaign a year ago and moving forward—faithful, joyful and fully committed to wherever God leads next.

A Smarter, Taller Plan for Students

Another possible change in scope involves enlarging the student area. After months of navigating fire-lane restrictions, city codes and the challenges of building on a slope, architects suggested a creative solution: instead of expanding outward, build upward.

"Our two-story student building was constructed almost 20 years ago with the infrastructure for a third floor," Renner explained. "And we think the best choice for us right now—this being our one shot to do it right—is to go ahead and build that third story."

This approach would allow students to enjoy new, purpose-built spaces while keeping WC Kids right where they are on the first two floors. The new third floor also would connect directly to the future gym and recreation area, creating a cohesive ministry hub that serves families for generations.

"Some of the concepts and designs we've seen are just stunning," Renner added. "We are excited about presenting these ideas to the congregation."

The Foundry: New Construction and a Fresh Update

As part of these evolving plans, a new Foundry—located near the sanctuary—is being formulated. It would seat 580 people and offer improved accessibility. Meanwhile, the current Foundry would transition into a flexible, multipurpose space for events, programs and fellowship gatherings.

It's a plan that honors the past while making room for what comes next.

Mission First, Always

Throughout the conversation, McKellar returned again and again to one core value: our buildings are here to serve the mission—not overshadow it.

"We try to build things that are nice, with decent air conditioning," he joked, "but not monumental."

He shared a guiding principle that has shaped decades of ministry at White's Chapel.

"I promised God, 'If You help us build

The Christmas Pyramid Throughout Advent & Christmas East Entrance near Evans Hall

Just inside the east "Welcome" doors near Evans Hall, a magnificent 23-foot Christmas Pyramid rises toward the




ceiling—a stunning reminder of the story of Christ's birth. Crafted by artisans in Germany, this one-of-a-kind structure beautifully tells the Christmas story through intricate tiers and hand-

carved figures.

The history of wooden Christmas pyramids dates back to the 16th century in Germany's Ore Mountain region. These early carousels, decorated with candles and small wooden figures, are believed to have inspired the tradition of the modern Christmas tree. Traditionally displayed on tabletops, the pyramids rotate gently when the heat from candles creates an updraft, setting the tiers in motion.

White's Chapel's pyramid takes that heritage to a new level. Built by a German craftsman to the church's specifications, it is recognized as the largest indoor pyramid in the United States. Each of its five tiers tells a different part of the Nativity story—from the Holy Family and shepherds to the Three Kings and angels above. Large faux candles light the display, while a motor keeps the tiers slowly turning, bringing the Christmas story to life in motion.

A breathtaking blend of faith, art, and tradition, the Christmas Pyramid welcomes all who enter the church this season—a radiant symbol of joy, craftsmanship, and the timeless story of Christ's birth. The display will remain in place throughout Advent and Christmas, inviting everyone to pause, reflect, and celebrate the wonder of the season.



CREATE YOUR FAMILY Advent Wreath

Materials

- Wreath Form (e.g., Styrofoam Ring)
- Four Candle Holders
- Four Taper Candles (Traditionally Three Purple, One Pink)
- One White Candle
- Real or Artificial Evergreen Branches (e.g., Fir, Spruce)
- Greening Pins

Instructions

Place the Candle Holders:

- Position the four candle holders evenly around the wreath form. Draw perpendicular lines on the styrofoam to mark the spots at 12, 6, 3, and 9 o'clock, then firmly push the candle holders into the form.

Cover the Wreath Form:

- Cut the evergreen branches into manageable pieces.
- Begin wrapping the branches around the form in a spiral pattern, using greening pins to secure them as you go.
- Continue until the entire form is covered.

Insert the Candles:

- Place the four candles into their respective holders.
- Place the white candle, called the Christ candle, in the center.

Light the Candles:

- First Sunday of Advent, Nov. 30
- As you light a purple candle say, "We light this candle for Hope. Jesus, help us trust Your promises."
- Second Sunday of Advent, Dec. 7
- As you light two purple candles say, "We light this candle for Peace. Jesus, help us bring peace to others."
- Third Sunday of Advent, Dec. 14
- As you light the two previous purple candles and the pink candle say, "We light this candle for Joy. Jesus, fill our hearts with Your joy."
- Fourth Sunday of Advent, Dec. 21
- As you light the four tapered candles say, "We light this candle for Love. Jesus, teach us to love like You."
- Christmas Eve/Christmas Day, Dec. 24/25
- As you light the previous four candles and the center white candle, say, "We light the Christ Candle. Jesus, thank You for coming to be with us."
