"Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith and in purity." (1 Timothy 4:12)

Do you remember the last time you asked yourself, "What do I believe, and why do I believe it?"

We often forget how important it is to wrestle with the difficult questions about our faith, allowing time and familiarity to get the best of us. Yet it is important to learn intentionally about the foundations of our faith and align our lives with what we believe.

In accordance with Wesleyan tradition, Confirmation marks a young believer's public acceptance of God's grace and

declaration of faith before those who have helped raise, instruct, nurture and invest in them.

"It's the moment we intentionally begin taking ownership of our relationship with Jesus Christ and our place within His Church. In baptism, God made promises to us. In Confirmation, we begin making those promises for ourselves. It is a public declaration that the faith we've inherited is becoming the faith we're choosing to live."

This fall, incoming WC students in grades 6-12 are invited to participate in Confirmation classes. Beginning Aug. 23, classes will meet every Sunday at 11 a.m. in Grace Chapel through Oct. 25.

A Gift That Keeps on Giving

One family's story reveals the life behind every blood donation

Some gifts are opened, enjoyed and eventually tucked away. Others grow up to be 6 feet 3 inches tall.

More than 20 years ago, White's Chapel member and choir singer Jenny Wennerberg and her husband, Evan, welcomed their son, Steven, nearly 2 1/2 months early. He was critically ill, and within two hours of his birth, doctors were asking permission to give him a blood transfusion.

"Basically, he needed the transfusion or he was going to die," Wennerberg recalls.

Evan immediately offered to donate, but Steven could not wait. Blood must be collected, tested and processed before it can be used, and the tiny infant needed it at once. His doctors also explained that blood for premature babies must meet special requirements, further limiting the pool of eligible donors.

Fortunately, the blood Steven needed was already there—because strangers had donated before the Wennerbergs ever knew they would need it.

Steven faced a long list of complications. His lungs were underdeveloped, a severe infection threatened his fragile body, and he needed a ventilator to breathe. He would receive at least two transfusions, with the second producing a remarkable change. "It was amazing how much better he did afterward," Wennerberg says. "He really perked up."

Treasures

We talked about it in worship last week: sometimes the greatest treasures are the ones we almost walk right past.

Several years ago, Mastercard ran a memorable series of commercials. They would list the cost of ordinary purchases:

Two movie tickets: \$24.

Popcorn and drinks: \$18.

Dinner afterward: \$62.

Then came the punchline:

"Watching your daughter laugh until she cries... Priceless."

The message was simple. Some things money can buy. The most important

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Confirmation

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Students will explore the story and history of Scripture, the foundations of Christian belief and what it means to be a member of the Church.

For Denise Bennett, co-director of WC Kids, Confirmation offers students the opportunity to examine the faith they have been taught and begin claiming it as their own.

“It is a long-standing tradition in Methodist churches where students participate in large- and small-group discussions and activities that help them grow in their relationship with Christ,” Bennett says.

Over the course of 10 weeks, pastors and leaders will help students explore questions about faith, sin, prayer, baptism, the Bible and Methodist traditions. Although designed to teach students about Christianity, the classes are more than an educational course; they are a spiritual formation experience.

Renner hopes the conversations will shape students’ hearts as much as their minds.

“Our aim isn’t so much information as it is transformation,” he says. “Our goal isn’t to make ‘really good Methodists’; it’s to make faithful followers of Jesus Christ.”

Confirmation is not a solitary act. It is a milestone reached with the support of family members and celebrated by the entire church. At each child’s baptism, the church body promised to nurture that child in the faith.

Parents are encouraged to support their students throughout the process by praying for them and remaining available for conversations as they prepare to take this step of faith. Renner believes the experience can strengthen the spiritual life of the entire family.

“There are very few seasons in life when families are intentionally encouraged to talk together about faith, ask honest questions, pray together and share their own spiritual stories,” he says.

Parents may attend a Confirmation orientation Sunday, Aug. 16, immediately following worship in Grace Chapel. Spring

classes also will be offered Wednesdays from 6 to 7 p.m. Registration is currently open and available on the church [website](#).

Students who are considering Confirmation but feel hesitant or unsure should remember that Jesus welcomes them as they are. All that is required is a humble and willing heart.

Renner encourages students not to be afraid of asking difficult questions.

“God is never threatened by honest questions, and some of the deepest faith is born through seeking,” he says. “I want students to know that God gave them a brain on purpose and that they honor God when they use that brain to pursue Him.”

Bennett agrees that students do not need to have all the answers.

“Readiness is less about already having all the answers and more about being

willing to learn and explore what it means to follow Christ,” she says.

Classes will conclude with a churchwide service Sunday, Nov. 1, when students will be welcomed into official membership at White’s Chapel. Students also will have the opportunity to be baptized.

Bennett describes the service as a joyful celebration for students, families and the church as they recognize each student’s commitment to following Christ and the beginning of a lifelong adventure of faith.

The service is also one of Renner’s favorite Sundays of the year.

“My prayer is that every student will not only understand what it means to follow Jesus but will genuinely feel that White’s Chapel is their church family,” he says. “We get to celebrate young people who are saying, ‘This is my faith. This is my church. I want to follow Christ.’”

Confirmation is not the end; it is the beginning. We pray that each student discovers God is already at work in their life and that He has immeasurably more in store for them than they could ever imagine.

about life and eternity while wrestling with work, success, family, time and humanity’s search for satisfaction.

Designed to help participants slow down, dig deeper and discover the richness of Scripture beyond the surface, this verse-by-verse study is for everyone. Together, participants will explore not only what the text says, but also what it means as they learn to read between the lines.

“Whether you’re a student making big decisions, a parent raising a family, someone building a career, enjoying retirement, celebrating successes or carrying disappointments, this book has a remarkable way of meeting us where we are,” Renner said. “It was written for people in every season of life because life itself is its subject. It reminds us that God isn’t afraid of our questions. He invites them. As we wrestle honestly with the realities of life, we’re led repeatedly to the One who gives life its deepest purpose.”

All that is required is a “willingness to come, listen, learn and allow God to speak,” he added.

“My prayer is that people leave each week not discouraged by the book’s realism but encouraged by its hope.”

With returning programs, book studies and classes planned, there is something in store for everyone this fall. Exciting updates and big transitions will meet our middle and high school students that will not want to be missed! Be sure to stay connected with leaders to learn what’s new!

WC Kids classrooms will be filled with faith, friendship and fun. This year, WC Kids is launching Wednesday Game Nights for elementary children, featuring kid favorites such as Gaga Ball, bingo, board games, team challenges and movie nights.

“We have gathered the top kid-favorite games and plan to spend each week packing tons of fun into our hour together,” said Hannah Robbins, WC Kids co-director. “I’m also really excited about the new curriculum for all age groups.”

Paired with a devotional and prayer, the game nights are designed to be both exciting and meaningful. This semester’s

lessons will follow “If I Could Ask God Anything: Awesome Bible Answers for Curious Kids” by Kathryn Slattery. The book addresses questions children commonly ask about God, including “If God is invisible, how do I know he’s real?” and “Does God ever sleep?”

WC Kids Choir also returns for children in first through sixth grades. Meeting from 5:30–6 p.m., the choir helps children build confidence in singing and worship while developing musical skills they will share through performances.

Children ages 4 through kindergarten may participate in choir and Bible lessons, learning songs they will perform during Christmas Eve and Palm Sunday worship services.

Three-year-olds will explore lessons based on “God Made Me from A to Z” by Allison Key Bemiss.

“We will be going letter by letter through the alphabet, learning about attributes God gives us,” Robbins explained. “Adventurous, brave, creative—all the way to zealous!”

Meeting from 6–7 p.m., the class will focus on a different attribute each week through hands-on activities and crafts.

With opportunities for every age, Wednesday nights offer many ways to find friendship and belonging.

“Wednesdays are perfect for the whole family because you don’t have to cook dinner, and then everyone goes to class to grow in their faith and hang out with friends,” Robbins said. “What better midweek pick-me-up?”

It is through building community that “conversations begin, friendships form, and a large church starts to feel much smaller,” Renner said.

“For those who are new to White’s Chapel, I honestly can’t think of a better way to become part of the life of our church,” he added. “You’ll not only grow in your understanding of Scripture, but you’ll also find yourself growing alongside people who are seeking Christ just as you are.”

Build a Home Project—
Trinity Habitat for Humanity
Saturdays, Oct. 3 & 31 | 7:30 a.m.–1 p.m.
Garden Springs Development, Fort Worth
White’s Chapel is again working with Trinity Habitat for Humanity to help fund and build a home in southwest Fort Worth. The church needs at least 24 volunteers for the build on Oct. 3. Volunteers must be at least 16 years old; those younger than 18 may not operate power tools.

Trinity Habitat for Humanity is a Christian ministry that partners with people in local communities to help them build or improve a place they can call home. Habitat homeowners help build their own homes alongside volunteers and pay an affordable mortgage. With the church’s support through sponsorship and volunteer service, Habitat homeowners can achieve the strength, stability and independence they need to build better lives for themselves and their families.
Volunteers will work on the home’s exterior, often alongside the home partner, under the direction of Habitat construction training leaders. Work may include raising walls, installing tornado fortifications and windows, and putting up siding. No prior experience is required.
The workday is from 7:30 a.m. to 1 p.m., but volunteers should plan to arrive early for a few words and prayer. Safety is the top priority, so the workday will begin with a safety lesson from the Cornerstone project manager.
Registration is required and opens Sept. 1. Early registration is preferred to assist with construction scheduling. Those registering additional volunteers should select the number of spaces needed and include the volunteers’ names in the comments field.
After registering, volunteers will receive an email containing the home’s address, information about what to bring and

wear, and a Trinity Habitat liability waiver to bring on the day of the event.

Finding Grace on
This Side of Heaven

Wide-open fields. Majestic skies. Distant horizons. A quiet country church resting beneath an endless sweep of blue.
These are the scenes that greet visitors to *This Side of Heaven*, the newest exhibition in the White’s Chapel Art Gallery. Featuring photographic prints and oil paintings by Texas artist Bill Stippa, the collection celebrates the beauty of the land—and the sacred stillness that can be found when we slow down long enough to notice it.

The exhibit was installed July 28 in the gallery, located in the front lobby of White’s Chapel. Through warm, richly layered paintings and carefully composed photographs, Stippa captures quiet fields, glowing sunsets and expansive skies where light seems to settle gently between earth and heaven. Churches appear in several of the works, but not as grand monuments. Instead, they stand as familiar markers of faith, community and memory—places that feel as though they have always belonged to the landscape surrounding them.
The oil paintings bring warmth, color, and texture to the collection, while the photographs preserve fleeting moments of light with clarity and restraint. Viewed together, the two mediums complement one another, inviting visitors to experience the land through both an artist’s interpretation and a

photographer’s attentive eye.
In a world that rarely seems to slow down, *This Side of Heaven* offers permission to pause.
The exhibition asks visitors to look more closely at the subtle shifts in color, shadow and texture that can easily escape our attention: sunlight warming an open field, the brilliance of a setting sun or the silhouette of a chapel against a wide Texas sky. These are ordinary scenes made extraordinary—not because the artist has changed them, but because he has helped us truly see them.
There is a peacefulness to the collection, but also a quiet sense of longing. The distant horizons seem to



remind us that heaven may feel beyond our reach, yet glimpses of its beauty are already present—in the land, in the light and in the places that hold our stories.
By pairing painterly warmth with photographic precision, *This Side of Heaven* creates a contemplative space where emptiness feels full, silence feels welcoming and the familiar becomes sacred. It is an invitation to take a breath, linger for a moment and rediscover the gentleness of the world around us.
A reception honoring Stippa and the exhibition will be held Saturday, Aug. 15 at 6:30 p.m. in the White’s Chapel Art Gallery. The exhibit is currently on display, and the gallery is open daily from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., as well as during all worship services and activities at White’s Chapel.

The baby doctors feared might not survive did far more than survive. Steven came home from the hospital on his original due date and continued to defy predictions of lung problems and developmental delays. He grew into a healthy young man who played varsity football, marched in the band and tried just about every sport imaginable.
Today, he stands 6 feet 3 inches tall—and donates blood himself.
“I felt like I needed to give back since I’m here because of someone else,” he once told his mother.
That gratitude remains deeply personal for Wennerberg. “People donated blood for my son—people I will never know,” she says. “They will never know what a blessing they were to us.”
White’s Chapel will offer others the chance to become that unknown blessing during its next Carter BloodCare blood drive Wednesday, Aug. 19, from 4 to 8 p.m. on the WC campus. The drive coincides with the return of Wednesday Night Dinner, making it possible to give life and then enjoy dinner—although perhaps in the opposite order.
Donors may reserve one of 54 appointment times through the Carter BloodCare website or simply walk in.

Each participant will receive a voucher for a free Wednesday Night Dinner, which may be used that evening or on another Wednesday.
“There is no substitute for human blood,” says Alynne Rivers, R.N. and White’s Chapel wellness director. “It can’t be manufactured. It can only come from donors. That makes every single donor incredibly important.”
A whole-blood donation can help as many as three patients because it can be separated into red blood cells, plasma and platelets. Those components help trauma victims, surgical patients, people undergoing cancer treatment and premature infants like Steven.
The entire donation experience generally takes about an hour and includes a brief health screening. For those unable to donate because of health concerns, encouraging an eligible friend or family member is another way to help.
For those who can give, the Wennerberg family offers a living picture of what an hour can mean.
“You may never meet the person who receives your blood. You may never know their family or hear their story,” Wennerberg says. “But your donation matters. My son is living proof of that.”
No cape is required. Just a little time, a willing heart and a seat on the Carter BloodCare bus. More than 20 years from now, your generosity may still be growing, thriving—and giving back.
