*"And you should not grieve... because we have hope... we have not lost our dear ones who have departed from this life but have merely sent them ahead of us..."—Augustine of Hippo*

Pain, death and loss are universal experiences that are difficult to face. At some point, everyone encounters loss, whether through death, divorce or other circumstances. Grief is inevitable in life and leaves a lasting impact on us. The pain of loss changes us, for better or worse. What truly matters is learning to grieve in a healthy way and to emerge from it not just surviving, but thriving and flourishing.

At White's Chapel, the Care and Support Ministries are passionate about providing resources and a place of belonging for those who are grieving. Loss can leave us crippled under its weight, making us feel as though we are barely making it through each day. However, in Christ, we do not grieve the way the world does. Echoing Paul's letter to the Thessalonians, we do not grieve without hope. In Christ, we have faith that even in our heartache, joy is coming and that He is near to the brokenhearted (Psalm 34:18).

If you are burdened with sorrow over the loss of a loved one, the Care and Support Ministry at White's Chapel offers a monthly resource for you. Surviving Grief Together is a monthly drop-in support group designed to help members navigate the wearisome journey of grief after the loss of a loved one.

another... [it is also] meant for our staff to get to know these new 7th graders and for them to get to know us..."

To individualize and pay dedicated attention to the 7th graders, this trip is designed to connect and engage in group-bonding activities and build personal relationships with their leaders. In a season of immense change, familiarity and normalcy are rare—our leaders want to be the exception by establishing a consistent and dependable presence in the students' lives.

"So often they can get overshadowed by all the current students that we already know, but this trip gives us intentional time with just them..." shares Joseph.

Buzzing with nerves and anticipation for the new school year, WC Students wants students to have FUN. These students' heads are swirling with new locker numbers, class schedules, changing friend groups, and extracurricular activities. "We believe it is vital for students to get outside of their heads and enjoy some out-of-the-ordinary excitement!"

"This trip is meant to be fast and fun," says Joseph, "We do a lot of group-bonding and group-building activities. If we can create moments of shared experiences, then we will have bonding moments that outlast the trip. In 2025, I officiated eight weddings. Four of them were for students I met on the 7th grade trip."

In the past, WC has taken students to many exciting places like Group Dynamix, Andretti Go Carts, Boulder Adventure Park, EPIC Water Park, a Texas Rangers baseball game, Pin Stack, and

Main Event. This year will not disappoint. Spanning two whole days, the schedule is packed with surprises and awesome destinations across the metroplex, full of fun activities and experiences.

At WC, we understand the pressure parents face in making sure their kids are thriving in both their education and social life. As your student prepares to make the transition into 7th grade, WC is here to support you as well.

"For parents, we want them to know that they can trust us," says Joseph. "We want them to know that we are in their corner. WC Students is supplemental to what they are doing in their homes to lead their kids to Jesus, and whatever it takes to help them. We want to encourage them, equip them, and be right there alongside them as they raise their kids to trust Jesus."

As a father, Joseph shares in the desire for the best for your children and understands how special this time of life is and the importance of building connections.

"This trip is special to me because it is where we begin to make these relationships with students that will last throughout their time in WC Students," says Joseph. see a building beginning to tell a story." And honestly, every church construction project tells a story.

There are the visible signs of progress—beams going up, concrete being poured and volunteers trying very hard not to park where the orange cones say not to park. But, there is also the deeper story: a growing congregation preparing space for ministry, families and community connections that have not even happened yet.

According to Rev. Victor Resendiz, the new facility is being designed to support worship, teaching, leadership development and family ministry in ways the current space can no longer fully accommodate.

This is not simply about adding square footage.

The vision for La Mesa reaches far beyond Sunday mornings. Leaders hope the campus becomes a gathering place where families find encouragement, children and youth discover safe spaces to grow, and neighbors who may have lived side by side for years finally begin building meaningful connections.

In other words, this is not just

construction. It is hospitality with steel beams.

Church member Lidia Toloza described the dream as "creating a place where people feel welcomed, heard and supported—a place where faith is expressed not only through worship, but also through listening, service and hope."

Of course, construction projects also come with their own special spiritual gifts: patience, flexibility and the ability to pretend you totally understand what words like "framing inspection" and "site grading" mean.

And while everyone naturally wants to ask, "So... when will it be finished?" church leaders are approaching the process one stage at a time. As Resendiz explained, some progress is easy to see, while other important work happens quietly behind the scenes in planning, adjustments and preparation.

Still, anticipation continues to grow. Because one day soon, the exposed beams will give way to full classrooms, worship gatherings, conversations in hallways, children racing toward activities and families discovering a church community where they truly belong.

Or, as Molina put it, "The dream is not simply to fill a building. The dream is to help build a community where people encounter Christ, grow in faith, and discover that they have a place at LaMesa."

of children in the Thrive program.

On Saturday, May 23, from 1–3 p.m., parents and siblings can connect, share and support one another while raising amazing families of children with additional needs during a fun outing at Urban Air Adventure Park in Southlake. The cost is \$5 per person.

This special event is designed for parents and children to connect, communicate and enjoy meaningful one-on-one time together. While parents receive encouragement and foster connections with others, children can participate in fun, age-appropriate activities that engage both their hearts and minds.

Raising children on neurodiversity journeys is a unique experience, and siblings are an important part of that family story. Older and younger siblings of children with special needs often face unique challenges, whether it is accelerated maturity, feeling overlooked, suppressing their own struggles or navigating emotional complexities. While these children learn to adapt to their siblings' needs, they also deserve support and individual attention from their parents for healthy emotional processing and development.

"Much like being a parent of an individual with additional needs, standing tall in the role of 'sibling' comes with its very own challenges," says Chelsea Cooper, Thrive Director at White's Chapel. "Siblings of individuals with neurodiversity and other additional needs show incredible love, patience and compassion, but they also carry their own thoughts, questions and emotions. As a ministry, we want to provide a specific and intentional place for our siblings as well."

Siblings of children with special needs often struggle to find individualized time with their parents because of the

complexities of daily life. While some siblings feel their experiences give them a deeper sense of understanding, others wrestle with frustration, jealousy and stress. This event is designed to give siblings and parents a moment of relaxation and excitement—a mini escape from daily responsibilities and pressures.

"Safe, noticed, supported," Cooper says. "All children should feel this way, regardless of family dynamics and responsibilities."

My Turn provides a safe, faith-filled space where children can release anxiety and the pressure to be the "perfect" child. Here, they can build friendships, share their hearts and grow in their relationship with God through encouraging conversations, fun activities and Biblical truth.

"At church, we believe every child is uniquely created and deeply loved by God," says Cooper. "My Turn is a special ministry designed just for siblings of individuals with special needs—a place where they can feel seen, supported and celebrated. This is a time set aside just for them to be poured into, uplifted and reminded of how important they are in God's story."

Every child is a masterpiece created by God. Each has a story. Each matters. And each deserves to experience love and care—disability or not. Simply put, every sibling deserves a turn.

Come join us for a fun afternoon as parents and siblings bounce around and make new friends together. Whether you are seeking supportive friendships, a place to serve or a new way to connect as a family this summer, the Thrive Ministry would love to welcome you.

"Whether families are looking for community, support or simply a meaningful afternoon out, this is a great event to be a part of with the Thrive ministry," Cooper says. "We are always excited to welcome new members and volunteers!"

## Mission Trip Portal

community. Whether attending to be baptized for the first time or to remember and reflect on a previous baptism, young adults are invited to share in the experience together.

The evening will begin with pizza and fellowship in Walton Chapel at 6:30 p.m. Worship and a message from Rev. Logan de Groot will follow at 7 p.m., with baptisms and baptism remembrances taking place afterward at the Jesus Fountain.

"This is for young adults who attend White's Chapel and want to be baptized for the first time or remember their baptism and become official members

Spiritual Care Living Room. Here, you are greeted with reassurance, support and a safe space to share your story. You will be equipped with new coping strategies that help you stay connected to your true self while also reinventing a new normal as you return to daily life with renewed intention, focus and vitality. You will meet others who are at different points along the same journey—those still searching for hope and those who have found it once again.

"People experience all types of loss in a lifetime," says Rev. Kyle Roberson, WC Associate Pastor. "The death of a loved one can be one of the most painful and confusing losses one experiences. Finding honest, authentic, nonjudgmental support after the death, walking with companions through the journey of grief, can make this experience tolerable and survivable."

What started as a resource available during parts of the year has now adopted a more flexible, ongoing schedule. While many classes and groups pause during the summer months, Surviving Grief Together will continue meeting year-round in response to requests from participants who desired continued support and connection. With its drop-in format, group members can attend as their needs and schedules dictate.

After the loss of a loved one, it can be incredibly difficult to stay connected to others. It can be a confusing and complex time—even disorienting and isolating. Roberson explains that within the first six months to two years after a loss, considered the early stages of grief, it can be difficult to maintain relationships and find people who truly understand what you are going through. However,

this group exists to remind you that you do not have to walk this journey alone.

At White's Chapel, "we want people not only to survive but, with time and patience, to thrive, finding new hope to choose to live an abundant life," says Roberson. "When surrounded by a godly community, you cannot help but feel God's comforting presence through the support of others."

From noon to 1 p.m., the group meetings provide a place to give and receive prayer. Monthly discussions help build friendships and allow room for participants to verbally process and share their stories. A concise yet insightful session is typically offered on a specific aspect of grief. During these sessions, participants receive help navigating loss and better understanding their own needs. This safe space fosters a deeper understanding of grief and the emotional responses it surfaces.

"Grief and mourning, often used synonymously, are two very different aspects of our reaction to the loss of a loved one," says Rev. Roberson. "Grief is all that we feel inside of us: the emotions, the feelings, the confusion, the indecision. Mourning is what we do with that grief; it's our grief gone public. Meeting in a supportive group setting allows us to share our grief, thereby allowing us to mourn."

"In this group, we are all in this together. We believe the only way to get through grief is to face it head-on with grace and honesty. By doing that, we can heal, cherish the memories we have, lean on each other and grow through the changes that grief brings. In that way, we can keep our hope alive."

Detour. While you wind your way from the children's playground, past the Adult Education wing, Grace Chapel, the Sanctuary, and Jesus fountain on your left, as well as the prayer chapel and columbarium, it's highly possible not to notice this route is bookended by two

small frame buildings—the Center for Spiritual Care and Walton Chapel. Two treasures that have played an invaluable role in the life and transformation of WC and its congregation.

The Center for Spiritual Care, formerly known as The Pettengill House for its previous owner, stands as a testimony to perseverance and changed lives. It has also been a favorite "haunt" of Mrs. Austin whose family donated a portion of our land and now dwells next door in the White's Chapel Cemetery. Walton Chapel, named for long-time, faithful member Nina Walton, is the site of the church's historical landmark, awarded in 1971. It is a replica of the frame building that served as the original sanctuary until what is now Grace Chapel was constructed in 1988 to accommodate the growing congregation. In 2008, Walton Chapel was relocated from the opposite side of the campus to its current spot, with only the wooden flooring surviving



the journey. Yet, it sits not only upon a cement foundation strong enough to hold a herd of elephants, but also a foundation of faith that has endured across the centuries and raised up hearts and souls that have welcomed the guidance of the Holy Spirit, earnestly sought to follow Jesus, and caught God's vision of the power and possibilities of welcoming others into the fellowship of

the Church.

So, now we embark faithfully upon the next leg of our journey to know Jesus and to make him known. And with each turn of the dirt, each pouring of a new foundation, we continue to tell the "old, old story of Jesus and his love." Love that is timeless; love that extends to all people; love that binds up wounds and sets us on new paths; love that has the ability to give us joy for this messy journey. And as we travel together into the future, I invite us to adopt Paul's encouraging words to the early Christians. Because with that teaching, we can adapt a new lens for our construction conundrum. One that focuses on our true calling and purpose:

*For our slight, momentary affliction is producing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all measure, because we look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen, for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal.*

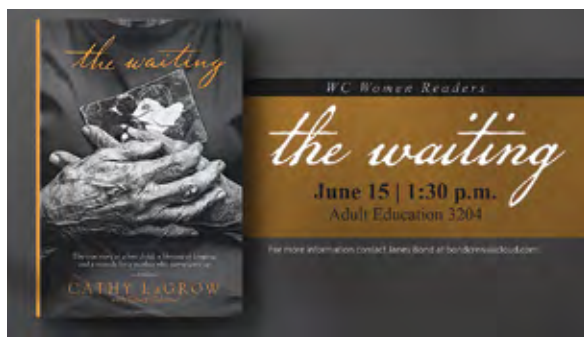
