Young Adults Serve Close to Home This Summer

This summer, White's Chapel Young Adults are heading out on their second mission trip—and this time, they are staying close to home.

From June 4–7, WCYA will serve in the Fort Worth community, partnering with Trinity Service Project, a ministry branch of White's Chapel that provides free home repairs for qualifying homeowners. It is an opportunity for young adults to make a difference right here in their own backyard.

Last year, the group embarked on its first mission trip to San Antonio, where participants partnered with Blueprint Ministries on renovation, repair and maintenance projects. Along the way, they built friendships, served others and discovered the joy of putting faith into action. For many who attended, the trip became more than a weekend of work—it became a reminder that meaningful service often changes the volunteer as much as the people being served.

Now, they are ready for the next step. "This is our second Young Adult-specific mission trip," said Logan de Groot. "Last year we went to San Antonio, and it was such a sweet time together. We grew in confidence when it comes to serving, and we also grew deeper in our relationships with one another. We're really excited for what this year holds."

There's Mother's Day, graduations, the start of vacations, and the end of the school year. Schedules shift and families spend more time together. And with all that togetherness comes the potential for tension, misunderstandings, and even the occasional argument.

I remember a few years ago I found myself in a surprisingly spirited "family fight" and it all started right here at church.

I was talking with a few of our pastors about a trip my wife Hannah and I had recently taken to Nashville. While we were at a restaurant, three men approached our table with a strange request. They had been debating for over an hour and wanted an outsiders'

expected to stay engaged in all things exciting and interesting. Navigating the endless expectations and uncertainties of this high-pressure season can lead to burnout, social comparison, anxiety and even guilt. That is why it is so important to slow down, make space to breathe and choose to live intentionally.

At White's Chapel, we want to create space for young adults to find connection and build a more sustainable, fruitful life. We believe that begins, in large part, by surrounding ourselves with peace, encouragement and community.

On Friday, May 29, at 7 p.m., WC YA will host a Night of Worship in the Foundry.

Designed for those seeking a deeper connection with Jesus, this gathering offers an immersive space to lay down burdens

and worship God just as you are. Young adults from across the DFW Metroplex are invited to slow down, lift praise together and step away from the noise of a busy week to receive the Word of God and make room for intentional stillness.

"The goal as a Christian is to grow close to God daily, and to do this, we have to make him a priority as we would friends and family," said Logan de Groot, WC College and Young Adults pastor. "When we meet as a community of believers, we see in real time what the kingdom of God looks like. It is so powerful to sit in a room with others worshipping together."

With all the chaos that can come with life in our 20s—often described as one of the most difficult and defining decades—it can be easy to become passive in faith. Through gatherings centered on worship, Scripture, connection and conversation, WC Young Adults hopes to help participants build lasting relationships and grow deeper in their walk with

Christ. This season, the group is studying Scriptures centered on the sacraments of communion and baptism while exploring what it means to be welcomed into the family of Christ as adopted and beloved children.

"Life is hard. Work, family, friends, etc., require so much of us, and often we find ourselves burnt out with no motivation," de Groot said. "It is easy to lose faith, but during times like that, we need to lean on the faith of those around us in our community. God is good. He is moving in very powerful ways, and being in spaces like this reminds us that many others like us desire to be with Christ and walk like Him in our worship and service."

For those who have never attended a worship night, de Groot emphasized that "this is not a performance or a concert. There will be times of quiet. We will not

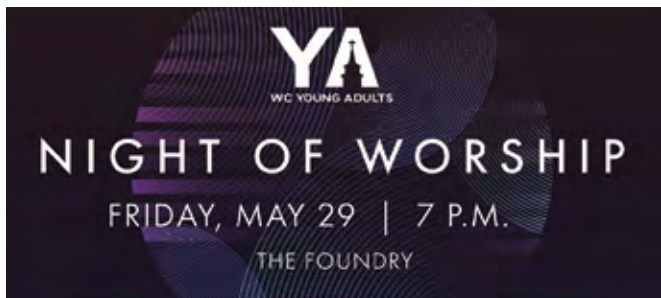
have a sermon, as we will let the Scriptures and teachings of Christ speak to us and allow the Spirit to illuminate our minds to receive the truth.

Nothing is expected of you. Just come as you are and trust that you will receive what you need if you are intentional."

Filled with soaring music, memorable characters and a story centered on identity, hope and belonging, Anastasia has become a favorite among audiences of all ages. This dazzling musical transports viewers from the twilight of the Russian Empire to the elegance and excitement of Paris in the 1920s, following a brave young woman determined to uncover the mystery of her past.

At the center of the story is Anya, a courageous young woman searching for answers about who she is and where she belongs. Along the way, she joins forces with a charming con man and a lovable ex-aristocrat. Together, they embark on an unforgettable adventure filled with danger, laughter, heart and the longing for home and family.

For WC Theater 2 Director Julie Blalock, bringing this story to life has been a long-awaited joy.

"Anastasia is a beautiful story of dreams and hope and family," Blalock said. "The students have been asking to do this show for quite a while and are so excited to finally be presenting it!"

That enthusiasm has fueled weeks of rehearsal as students tackle one of the most ambitious productions in the program's history. If you have ever tried singing while dancing while remembering where to stand while pretending to be in 1920s Paris, you already know this is no small task.

Blalock is joined by Music Director Eleni Brooke, whose leadership has helped students rise to the challenge of a demanding score.

"The music is challenging, but thanks to Eleni's leadership and creative instruction, the kids are killing it!" Blalock said.

The production also features choreography by Ann-Marie Heilman, lighting design by Christian Brooke and sound by WC Productions. Digital backdrops will help transform The Foundry into grand palaces, busy train stations and the romance of Paris, proving once again that a little theatrical imagination can go a very long way.

Behind the scenes, a dedicated stage crew composed of Lee Blalock, Rylan Dixon, Zoey Heilman and Emily Morris is helping bring the story to life. Costumes were developed through the work of Julie Blalock and Eleni Brooke, adding

another layer of beauty and authenticity to the production.

While the show is filled with humor, romance and adventure, it also draws from a turbulent period in history. Set during the Russian Revolution and the years that followed, the story reflects themes of loss, change and resilience.

"One challenge is that the story carries dramatic moments tied to the Russian Revolution, so we have worked carefully to present those scenes in a thoughtful way that remains family-friendly while staying true to the heart of the musical," Blalock said.

That thoughtful balance has become a hallmark of WC Theater productions. Over the years, the program has learned how to tell meaningful stories in ways that are welcoming to families while still stretching young performers artistically.

And stretch they have. What once may have been a first timid line onstage has turned into students confidently carrying lead roles, learning harmonies, mastering choreography and discovering the teamwork required to pull off a full musical. Ask any cast member, and they will likely tell you theater teaches far more than lines and lyrics. It teaches responsibility, courage, creativity and what to do when someone misses an entrance.

To help with parking and traffic flow during construction, Dorothea Christ, Involvement Director, is coordinating golf cart and shuttle assistance to move members and guests safely from parking areas to campus destinations.

"At this moment, we are exploring the ability to assist with Sunday traffic concerns due to construction and getting folks to and from the parking lot safely and securely," Christ said.

For now, the focus is Sunday mornings, when parking lots can feel a bit like a live-action puzzle. But transportation help may grow in the months ahead.

"We will also be looking at future endeavors on how the golf carts and shuttles can be beneficial for the fall kickoff," she said.

Currently, two golf carts have been operating each weekend, with the option to add more as needed. In other words, if the lot starts looking like the State Fair,

reinforcements are ready.

Volunteers are helping drive the carts and assist with transportation, and more volunteers are welcome. Those interested in driving church-owned vehicles need a valid driver's license. Christ said the church also plans to implement a basic vehicle safety course along with a motor vehicle report through the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"We are currently using volunteers as needed," Christ said. "We are also looking into the future needs for the fall with volunteers."

Volunteer shifts are available through the church's online signup system, where helpers may choose open time slots that fit their schedule.

Those interested in serving can sign up through the [church website](#), via SignUpGenius, by scanning a QR code when available, or by contacting Christ directly.

So if construction has moved your usual parking place three counties over, take heart. Help is on the way—one golf cart at a time.

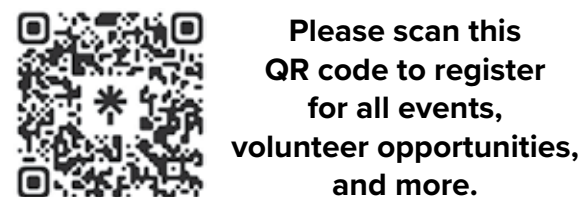

Trinity Service Project, the agency helping coordinate jobs for the WCYA Mission trip, works alongside La Mesa Church to improve safety, accessibility and livability for residents who may not otherwise be able to afford needed repairs. Through volunteer labor and practical help, the ministry allows families to remain in their homes with dignity and pride.

Projects may include painting, yard cleanup, minor repairs, accessibility improvements and other hands-on tasks that make everyday life safer and more manageable. While the work may seem simple, the impact can be lasting for

families who need an extra hand.

For many young adults, life can feel packed to the brim. Between work, school, relationships and everyday responsibilities, it can be difficult to carve out time—or finances—for travel and service opportunities. This trip was designed with that reality in mind.

Participants will leave Thursday afternoon and return early Sunday morning, requiring only one workday off. Transportation, lodging, meals and materials are included in the \$200 trip cost.

"Having a local mission trip isn't really about convenience or ease—it's about intentionality and accessibility," de Groot

said. "Being close to home makes it more approachable, especially for someone who may be stepping into their first mission trip. It also opens the door for this to become a rhythm for us, not just a one-time experience."

She added that serving nearby can carry a unique impact.

"There's something powerful about seeing the lasting impact of your work up close," de Groot said. "It also opens our eyes to the reality that there are people in need right here, right now. We don't have to go far to make a difference—we

can step into that today." Scholarships are available during registration, and White's Chapel hopes finances will never be the reason someone stays behind. Those who need assistance or would like to sponsor a participant are encouraged to contact de Groot.

"We are the hands and feet of Christ," she said. "The call of the church is to go and serve, and this is one tangible way we get to step into that. A mission trip might feel outside of your comfort zone, but that's often where real growth happens."

For young adults seeking purpose, community and a chance to live out their faith, this trip offers all three.

Come join WCYA as they step into service, connection and something new. Sometimes the biggest impact begins just down the road.

opinion. They showed us two pictures and asked a simple question: **Which of these two people is more globally recognizable?** The two choices were Michael Jordan and Paul McCartney.

Hannah and I answered differently. I said Michael Jordan. She said Paul McCartney.

Needing to have this resolved to see which one of us was right—we took it to the office. And what seemed like a lighthearted moment turned into a full-blown debate back at church. It quickly grew into a staff-wide discussion, with nearly 20 people weighing in and the vote was almost perfectly split. So I took it to social media, where more than 250 people voted. The results? Nearly 50/50.

Then, I mentioned the debate to my parents on the phone. Confident in my position, I said, "What is Hannah thinking? Obviously, Michael Jordan is more globally recognizable than Paul McCartney."

Their response was immediate and emphatic. They disagreed. What followed was a surprisingly intense 15-minute argument. Now, it wasn't a serious fight—99% of it was in good fun, but there was at least 1% of us that felt very committed to being right. It's funny how even the smallest things can spark disagreement within families. But it's also revealing.

The simple truth is that families are messy. We don't always see eye to eye. We misunderstand each other. We argue about things that, in the grand scheme, don't really matter all that much. And sometimes, those small disagreements

can grow into something much bigger. We see this same dynamic in Scripture in the story of Jacob and Esau. Jacob cleverly and connivingly convinces his brother Esau to give up his birthright for some food when he's really hungry one day. And this deception turns into a deep and painful division. The brothers are separated for over twenty years. But that's not the end of their story.

In Genesis 33, Jacob and Esau finally meet again. It's a tense moment. As readers, we wonder how Esau will respond to the brother who wronged him so deeply. Will he attack him? Yell at him? Demand back his inheritance? It's none of the above. The Bible says—**"Esau ran to meet him, and embraced him, and fell on his neck and kissed him, and they wept."**

Instead of anger, there's grace. Instead of revenge, there's reconciliation. Family proves stronger than the wounds of the past. And that's the truth about families. We fight. We hurt one another. But, we are also capable of forgiveness, healing, and love.

See, oftentimes God works through our families' messiness. Like Jacob's family, despite its flaws and failures, would go on to become the foundation of the twelve tribes of Israel. What began as a complicated, imperfect family became central to God's unfolding story.

As Methodist pastor Rev. Jacob Armstrong writes in his book *God's Messy Family*, "God's family is a mess—a big, beautiful mess, but a mess nonetheless."

So this May, as we celebrate and spend time with family let's remember that all of our families are a mess. But that's okay—because they always have been, and God uses them anyway.

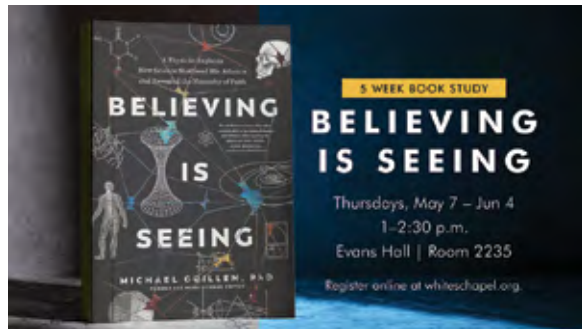
